

THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Cereals Held Their Own: First, with a Good Advance Following.

WHEAT TRADERS WATCHING PARFIDRE.

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—(Special Telegram to The Bee.)—Markets on 'change generally started with a healthy tone and considerable activity. Prices for cereals were about steady at first, but advanced later in the day with a very fair advance. Hog products were weak and lower all around on extra heavy receipts and lower prices at year's. The sales for May are as follows: Wheat, 55c to 60c; corn, 31c to 34c; oats, 22c to 24c; pork, 80c and 81c; lard, 52c to 54c; ribs, 40c and 41c.
