According to the indictment, Williamson is charged with being one of the principals in a land company formed for the purpose of selling lots in Mont-rose, which lots were extelled to the skies for their beauty and their convenient and elegant surroundings. All these allurements were deciared to be fram dulent and to exist only in the vivid imagination of the principals who sent extravagantly worded advertisements through the mails and disposed of numerous lots to the gullible denizans of Colorado and the surrounding

When the victim remitted the cash for a lot in this modern paracise a deed was re-turned to him by mail and the company did a veritable land office business.

The indictment was sent to the district attorney and marshal in this city and steps were at once taken to apprehend Mr. Williamson. He was in the headquarters of a medical firm on Parnam stroet and at once admitted that he was the identical George W. Williamson named in the indictment. He was taken before Judge Dundy and expressed his entire willingness to return to Denver to stand trial. He stated that he had been employed by the land company as a clerk and had no interest in the business any further than signed the deeds merely as a clerk and had no interest in the business any further than to draw his salary. He said an indictment had been found against him in June last and he gave bonds for his appearance. He then came to Omaha and the indictment was afterwards set aside. The indictment on which he had been arrested was found December 20, last, and was news to him. He expressed a design to have the matter settled. expressed a desire to have the matter settled as soon as possible and only asked for time to arrange his practice so he could leave without injury to his patients.

He was given over to the custody of the marshal to be taken to Denver at the beginning of the next term of court.






