SOUTH OMAHA NEWS.

Caught a Rib Out of Joint. Mrs. Panchida, wife of George Panchida, who has been ill, is a coughing fit, bronchitis or dislocated rib. Meeting of the Board of Education. President Persons, Secretary Finton and Messrs. Robinson and State of the board of education met Monday night. The committee on school sites reported having purchased the lot in Brown Park and the bill was approved and ordered paid. Miss Sadie Spelman, teacher at Alburgh, resigned and Miss Harriet Shook was appointed to her place. Miss Ethel Sampson was elected a teacher, to be assigned when needed. The question of more school houses and buildings was discussed but no definite action was decided on. A number of approved bills were entered paid.

Stock Business. During last week of the 10,668 cattle received 5.37 or 0.69 per cent were consumed in the local packing houses and 5,122 forwarded. Of the 5,122 forwarded 3,548 were sent to slaughter houses in local packing houses and only 2,574 forwarded. Of the 1,901 sheep received, 1,833 per cent were marketed here. The percentage of slaughter during February was up to the highest mark. The following table shows the receipts, consumption and shipments and the increase and percentage of cattle, hogs and sheep during February.

The Live Stock Exchange. Fifty members of the Live Stock exchange were present when W. B. Wallwork called the meeting to order Monday afternoon. The legislative committee appointed to look after the fair on No. 34, regulating stockyards and governing sales in stockyards, was discussed by Messrs. E. D. Loevy, Fred W. Gasman and W. H. Dunbar. The committee on the fair, consisting of E. D. Loevy, general manager of the American live stock commission company, was rejected.

Proceedings of the City Council. Mayor Stone and Councilmen Burke, Rowley, Melcher, Conley, Towl, O'Rourke and Dougherty were present at the meeting of the city council. The committee on paving Twenty-fourth street was granted further time. Ordinance No. 249, for a sidewalk on the north side of Q street from Thirtieth to Thirtieth-ninth streets, No. 250, establishing the grade of Missouri avenue; No. 251, for sidewalks on the north side of K street from Twenty-fourth to Twenty-fifth streets, on Twenty-fifth street, on Twenty-fifth street, on Missouri avenue from Thirtieth to Twenty-fifth streets, on L street from Twenty-fourth to Twenty-fifth streets, on Twenty-fifth street from P to L street, on P street from Twenty-fourth to Twenty-sixth, on Railroad street from Thirtieth to Thirtieth-third streets, on Twenty-third from H to O streets, on Twenty-fourth from S to Q streets, and No. 252, authorizing \$25,000 paving bonds, were referred to the ordinance committee.
