"What do you wish to say in the matter, Mrs. Wood?" asked the court. Between her sobs the little woman replied:

"Nothing more than that I have lost all control over George. He curses me and tortures me every day. He is twenty-one years old and we have known each other since he was born."

"He doesn't seem to have to swear that you're on the land?" said the boy.

"Yes," returned the boyish Baldwin, "but that is easy, as you will see when you get the land, and if you don't give the boy away, how can anyone know that you have not lied there for years?"
