VERY BUSY DOING NOTHING. Hon, Euclid Martin's Talk on World's

Fair Work. Hon, Euclid Martin, who is a member of the executive committee of the World's Columbian Exposition commission, left Tuesday afternoon for Chicago to attend the April meeting of the commission

From various sources the impression has gained currency that there is considerable feeling among members of the commission with regard to the attitude of President Palmer and other members of the board of control. It is quite apparent to some of the commissioners that the board of control, which consists of only eight members, desires to manage the affairs of the exposition to a very large degree, with-out the assistance—for the present at least of either the entire board of commissioners or the executive committee.

Speaking of the matter to a reporter for THE BEEM'R. Martin said:
"The organization of the World's Columbian exposition took place last June. There was, naturally, a little strife for positions. This continued until the committees were finally appointed and every man knew where he would be expected to work. After this had been done it was found that the organ-ization was too cumbersome, and at the No-vember meeting it was decided to change the plan of the organization so that much of the active work might be done through bureaus instead of through the committees, as pro-

vided for in the original organization.
"One of the last things done at the November meeting was the creation of a board of control consisting of eight members, the president and vice-chairman being by the motion made members of this committee, This committee was given powers equal to the commission itself or the executive com-mittee when neither of these bodies were in session. President Palmer is president of

session. President Paimer is president of
the commission, chairman of the executive
committee and of the board of control. Consequently it lies with him to call either the
executive committee or board of control
when he deems it necessary to call either.
"The board of control has had several
meetings since, one of them occurring in the
latter part of February. I was in Chicago at
this time and called at the headquarters of
the national commission, and found the
officers were much in favor of the April meeting. It will be remembered that at that time ing. It will be remembered that at that time congress was considering an appropriation for the expenses of the World's Columbian commission, and it looked very much as if there would be, practically, none made; so that the officers as well as the commission would be without any money at their com-mand. Soon after this, however, congress made an appropriation of \$55,000, and later on Secretary Foster transferred \$10,000 of the teral appropriation so that it could be used

by the national commission.
"Notwithstanding this fact the board of control saw no real reason, why the commis-sion should meet in April according to the by-laws, and President Palmer issued a circular letter advising the commission that the work was being efficiently and satisfactorily done, and saying that he saw no reason

why the commission should meet.

"Some people have been so ungenerous as to conclude that a meeting of the commission in April, by which part of the appropriation would be absorbed, might interfere with the would be absorbed, might interfere with the officers' salaries and the expenditures of the officer; and I for one see no necessity of continuing a large expenditure in keeping up the offices of the National commission and the officers at high priced salaries if there is no need of the commission. If the work caff be satisfactorily carried on by the Chicago local board, and the National commission is simply an example of the salaries and the National commission is simply an ornamental body, I submit that the elegant suite of offices in the Rand-MeNalty building should be abandoned and the salaries of the officers of the National commis-sion reduced so that they would compare favorably with the salaries of the commisoners.
"I believe the action of the local board has

a tendency to localize the fair, and it has had a very bad influence upon a number of states making their appropriations for state ex

"Has there been any concerted effort on the part of the commissioners to secure lib-eral appropriations from the state legisla-tures!"

"I think there has. I know in this state there has been an extraordinary effort made or there would have been no appropriation, as the lower house was naturally averse to making an appropriation at all.' "Do the by-laws provide for any regular meetings of the commission?"
"They provide for two semi-annual meet-

Ings!"
"At what time!"

"One in April and the other in October."
"Did President Palmer call the April meeting!"
"He did not. If a quorum attends the

April meeting it will be, in my judgment, be-cause the commissioners feet that there are important matters to be looked into and they will voluntarily attend this meeting."

jail during his residence in Omaha.



WRECKED IN THE YARDS.

An Engine Jumps the Track With Disastrous Results. Union Pacific engine No. 1186 is a "hoo-

Seven weeks ago, when the engine had been out of the shops but a few days it jumped the track and killed Engineer Jake Jensen, besides surjously injuring several of

the train men. At 9 o'clock yester lay morning the same engine jumped the track in the yards directly east of the new freight depot, causing a bad wreck and seriously injuring Engineer Frank Campbell. James McCoy, a switchman who was riding in the cab, was badly shaken up, but was able to walk home.

The engine has been out of the shops but a few days, having had extensive repairs in the shape of a new cab, and new woodwork

The accident was caused by the soft ground in the yards which allowed the track to sink about a foot. The engine was south bound and pulling a heavy train of freight cars. When near Jackson street the engine struck a piece of track on soft ground and jumped the rails, running about two car lengths. when it turned nearly end for end and rolled

The tender also jumped the track and was turned around, being torn from the trucks but otherwise uninjured. A freight car loaded with lumber immediately behind the engine was torn from its tricks and used entirely over the tender, alighting on top of the engine where it remained, grace-fully balanced on the boiler of the iron horse. Engineer Campbell remained at his post and was carried over with his engine. He was pinned down by the debris of the cab and narrowly escaped death. The escaping steam enveloped him, but William Hay, who was in charge of the train, threw his coat over Campbell and prevented the steam from scalding him. As soon as possible Campbell was removed from his perilous position and was taken to his home at Twenty-third and Pierce streets. A hasty examination by and Pierce streets. A hasty examination by the physician indicated that the right leg was broken and the foot crushed, but the exact nature of the injuries was not determined.

Tom Griffin, the fireman, was at his post in the cab, but was thrown out when the en-

gine turned over and escaped with a severe shaking up.

James McCoy, a switchman, was in the cab and was thrown out, but was not serious-

ly injured.

William Hay, who was in charge of the train, was riding in the cab, but jumped in time to avoid injury. He received a few scratches on the ceived to the train that was in charge of the ceived a few scratches on the arm. Mr. Hay was in charge of tho train which the same engine was pulling when Jake Jensen was killed, and escaped death by jumping.
