SOUTH OMAHA. Still Forging Ahead.

The season's packing shows South Omaha more than holding her own in the hog packing industry. The total packing for the sea-870,000 for the corresponding period last year, again of 330,000 or 36,87 per cent. Chicago still maintains safely her first place, with 500,000 slaughtered as compared with 325,000 for the corresponding season last year, a gain of 175,000, equal to 53.85 per cent. Kansas City has slaughtered 135,000 as compared with 110,000, a guin of 25,000, equal to 22.73 per cent. South Omaha having made a magnificent spurt, has almost equalled her only rival for the place next to Chicago. She staughtered 115,000 as compared with 71,000 a gain of 44,000, or 61.97 per cent. Nothing could be more gratifying to friends and patrons of the South Omaha market than this showing. The report shows that South Omaha has made the largest percentage of increase of any of the great packing centers, that its slaughterings are only 20,000 less than Kansas City's, that South Omaha's increase in slaughterings has been almost double Kansas City's, and that of the total slaughterings at the city on the Kaw and in the Magic City the former has 54 and the latter 46 per cent.

With the representatives of nearly all eastern packers as well as all the minor markets in Iowa and this state buying at this point thus causing shipments to meet de-mands, the friends of South Omaha have every reason to expect to safely land in the easy chair of second place before the close of the season.
