THE BEARS WERE ON TOP AND HAPPY.

Wheat a Source of Disappointment-Influences Were Against the Corn Trade-Cattle and Hogs Also Off.

CHICAGO, April 22.-[Special Telegram to THE BEE.]-The easier feeling which caused + harp decline in prices on 'change yesterday was noticeable this morning. Prices for at leading cereals and products not only opened at lower figures, but further decline followed. During the first hour wheat sold at \$1.12% to 11.11 for May, and \$1.105 to \$1.005 for July. There was a partial rally before 11 o'clock. Corn sold off to 715c for May and 665c for July, and also railied slightly. Park opened with a drop of 10c to 15c and sold off to \$12.85for July, or 20% under the close last night. Lard and ribs showed a decline from yesterday of flor at the time of morning call.

The wheat market was a puzzle to outsiders and the source of much disappointment to a large part of the trade today. The decline like the advance, once under way, went farther than most traders expected. Yesterday morning May wheat sold at \$1.16 and July at \$1.14. About noon today May sold at \$1.10% and July at \$1.05. The best prices made today were just after the opening when May sold a \$1.12)% and July at \$1.10%.
