NEWS FROM COUNCIL BLUFFS.

Landlord Crawl Makes an Unexpected Trip to Kearney.

INDICTED BY THE GRAND JURY THERE.

He Tells the Story of a Real Estate Deal on Which the Charge is Based—His Wife Implicated.

A tall, slim man was in the city all day Sunday and most of the time in the company of Marshal Tompkins. That gentleman introduced him as Mr. John Wilson, a friend of his. It developed yesterday morning that the friendship existing between Mr. Wilson and the city marshal was mostly of a professional kind. That fact was brought to the surface by the departure of Wilson and Mr. Charles F. Crawley, the proprietor of the Pacific house, for Kearney, which took place yesterday afternoon.

Crawley and his wife, it is learned, were both indicted by the Buffalo county grand jury at its last session, the indictment having been returned about a week ago. Mr. Crawley was indicted at the same time as her husband, but she had a certificate from a physician stating that she was too ill to be moved and she remained in the Pacific house. Mr. Crawley started to report, when asked about the matter that the arrest was the outgrowth of a business transaction which he had while he lived in Kearney, just before his removal to the Bluffs. He sold a lot in Woodruff addition to Kearney to one N. Woodruff of Peoria, Ill., and the deed to the property was duly recorded. Several months before the sale to Woodruff, Mr. Crawley had a deed in blank to the property signed by himself and wife. In some manner, as he said, the deed in blank was somehow getting away from him till after the sale to Woodruff, when it turned up in the hands of a man named Feathers, who had been employed at the presence of the danger and even Tinley, who was at the elevator, could not get the machine stopped.

BOUND TO HAVE IT. South Siders Will Get the Motor on Thirteenth Street.

The South Thirteenth street property owners are camping on the trail of the street railway company. Another meeting was held last evening at Huscall's hall and about two score of interested property owners were present.

James Huscall occupied the chair. As a member of the committee appointed to wait on the South Omaha authorities he said that he had been down there and learned that Armour and others were working to have the motor line extended to that city. They would furnish some money.

The county engineer has surveyed a line to the boundary of Sarpy county, and the city engineer of South Omaha would agree to it, and the authorities of that place would cooperate. If they could get a croaker they would put on appraisers.

The site of the new Fort Croaker can be reached, and this was important, as the new post will be permanent and more important than the present one.

Mr. Michael Donovan, as chairman of the committee appointed to wait on the street railway company, said that the company had commenced preparations to build to the south city limits and South Omaha via Thirteenth street, and intended to have it in operation by August.

Mr. Brennan had waited upon Mr. Al. bright and said the Metropolitan directors would hold a meeting soon.

Mr. Donovan thought a bank commissioner ought to be appointed from the south side, and Hon. James C. Brennan was unanimously selected to be recommended for that position with the ratification of the solid south side.

A petition was introduced asking the street railway company for better Sunday service on the south side lines. It was rather general, the petitioners, residing in the south side, but he finally put it and it went with a whoop and the meeting adjourned for two weeks.

He had been evicted from the Forest house by the thieves, and it was proven that he had brought with them a car load of ponies, but when the officer arrived, upon the scene they found the ponies and he was unable to find one of them.

MAY PROVE FAIAL. Ed Tankard, a Machinist, Receives Serious Injuries.

Ed Tankard met with a very serious injury yesterday afternoon. He was employed at the Minneapolis & St. Paul railway shops.

After quitting work last evening at 5:30 o'clock he jumped upon the rear end of a St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha incoming train to ride to Nicholas street.

When the train and Nicholas street Tankard jumped off and fell. As he fell his head struck a freight car standing on an adjoining track. Several bones were broken. He was employed at the crossing saw the man jump and saw him fall. They immediately ran to his assistance. Tankard was thrown into a bleeding body, his face had several deep cuts in it and the skull was severed entirely off from the left side. The patrol wagon was called to assist and the injured man taken to St. Joseph's hospital.
