
Soldiering Expensive Business. Soldiering is a costly business to the state. The two regiments recently sent to the coke regions at an expense of over \$2,000 a day already aggregate about \$20,000. Judge Black once said it would be cheaper to pay laboring men the advance demanded out of the state treasury than to send soldiers to quell strikes. The capitalists and railroad companies make most of the money out of the coal business, and just now they are fighting the tax bill before the legislature, because it requires them to pay something nearer a fair propertion of taxes. They want the state to protect them against the lawless Huns they imported some years ago, because they would work cheaper than the Americans, Irish, Ger-mans and others. But at the same time these big coal and transportation companies insist upon the farmers continuing to pay more than their proper share of the taxes although they never ask or require any police or military protec-tion from the state.

#### The Silver Dollar "M."

There is a popular idea prevalent that the minute letter "M" to be seen at the base of the head of Liberty on the face of the present issue of silver dollart stands for "Mint," and is an evidence of the genuineness of the coin bearing it. This is a mistake. The "M" stands for Morgan, George T. Morgan, who is the orginator of the design.
