John Brown was sentenced yesterday to fifteen days' confinement in the county jail on bread and water by Judge Healy for stealing a coat from Henry Osthoff.

Officer Cyprian arrested George Ball at the corner of Twenty-fourth and Corn streets yesterday afternoon for attempting to sell counterfeit money. Ball will have a hearing today.

About a week ago a fine ladies' gold watch was taken from a prisoner at the police station. The watch is supposed to have been stolen, and is in charge of Chief Seavey awaiting a claimer.

Nels Yensen, the Swede who has been stealing carpenter's tools for the past two weeks, yielded examination in police court yesterday, and was bound over in the sum of \$1,000. About \$400 worth of tools were taken and recovered by the detective. Most of his plunder was planted in South Omaha.

CHARGED WITH MURDER.

McNamee's Case Now Being Heard—News of the Court.

The courts were all in session yesterday morning, and the work of the May term commenced in earnest. Before Judge Estelle the case against Thomas McNamee was commenced, and the greater portion of the day exhausted in securing a jury.

It is charged that on February 18, McNamee murdered one Edie Williamson, in a Ninth street house of ill fame. The defendant expects to prove that on the day prior to the alleged commission of the crime, the Williamson woman was in a state of intoxication, fell down stairs and sustained injuries that caused her death.

Dr. Clavick was the only witness examined. He testified that he was called in to see the Williamson woman on the morning of the Monday prior to her death, which occurred Friday. She was lying in a state of intoxication. He was also present at the post mortem. Saw the brain after it was removed. It was badly discolored on the right side, which indicated that disease had been struck on the head. The other organs of the body were in a healthy condition. He thought death resulted from a blow upon the right side of the head.

McNamee was an interested spectator and seemed to express considerable surprise when his testimony suggested that Bright's disease might have accounted for the discoloration of the brain.

In Judge Irvine's court, the case of aolph Kolberg against the Belt line railway company is on trial. Two years ago, during fair time, Kolberg and a number of others were on North Nineteenth street, opposite the fair grounds. Kolberg was struck by a passenger engine and injured. He claims negligence upon the part of the company in not giving notice of the approach of its train and suing for damages.

Judge Walcott heard testimony and arguments in the matter of the injunction of Thomas Swartz against the electric light company and took the case under advisement.

In Judge Hopenell's court the case of Maren St. Peterson against her husband, Sven T. Peterson, is on trial. The wife is suing for divorce, a division of the property, which is valued at \$90,000, and the custody of the two minor children. The husband offered the wife \$10,000 and agreed not to make a defense but she demanded more, and the case will now be fought to a finish.
