

A VETERAN OF THE MINES. Interesting Reminiscences of the West Mr. Joseph Voshav, one of the proprietors of the Washington gold mine near Idaho City, idaho, is a guest of Mr. Charles Balbach at 1501 Harney street, Mr. Vosbay is of French parentage and thinks his patronymic was originally Voche, but like himself has become thoroughly anglicized. His life since he was twenty years old has been spent in mining camps. There is not a mine of any note in the United States which he has not visited at some time. He was one of the "Forty Miners" and made the journey across the as with a number of other people with an

The trip from Independence, Mo., con-sumed something over four months. His first adventure was unique. The progress of the oven was very slow, and he was accustomed to go in advance of the train for some distance and got a view of the country before the rost of the party came up. One day he got out of sight of the train, and being some what latigued, lay down on the ground and fell raisen. He was awasened by the clatter of hoofs, and looking up found himself sur-rounded by a small party of Sioux Indians. They were painted in the most elaborate manner and the boy's heart sank with fear "As soon as I opened my eyes I thought of my mother," said Mr. Voshav, "and menally bade farewell to all my friends and all my dreams of fortune. I would have sold my interest in that expedition very cheap. I'd have gone with the Indians if they had asked me to, but they didn't. Just before starting somebody had told me that the Indians greatly admired little pocket looking classes, as they were a wonderful nevelty to them, and I had brought a haif dozen with me, had presence of mind enough to think of and taking one from my pocket jumped from his pony and approached me, Holding the little mirror before his face he ttered a yell of wonder and delight and me tioned to his companions, who crowded around him and re-echoed his shrill 'Whee-Pointing first to the glass and then at a buffalo robe which he brought from his pony, he

said: "Swap! Swap! "This unexpected turn of affairs nearly took my breath away, but I managed to signify my assent to the trade, and leaving the buffalo hade he rode away triumphantly with the looking glass, followed by the rest of the

band,
"When the train came up, as it did in a few moments after the Indians had disappeared. Lexhibited the buffulo robe and told the story, much to every one's astonishment. The robe was a magnificent specimen, of the for it until it was discovered that it was inhabited. Then I threw it away, together with all the clothes I had on and putting on another suit left the scene. I was minus my looking glass and a suit of clothes, but considered myself very lucky that I stiff had my scalp-lock intact. "I met with considerable success in mining during the year following our arrival in Cali-

formia, but in the winter of 1851 we had a terrible experience. We were shut up in the mountains by a heavy fall of snow and had such a hard time of it that this place got the name of "Starvation Camp." I had a dog of whom I thought a great deal and I used to keep tim close beside me all night for fear somebody in the camp would kill and eat nim. I thought if it became necessary to eat nim I would prefer to have him myself. We did eat some mule meat a man sold to us and called 'elk.' Afterward with the help of the miners he brought some flour from another camp. The men were snow shoes and laid the sack on branches of trees and hauled it. This flour he sold first at \$1.50 a pound, afterward at \$2.50 and finally at \$5. No one was allowed to buy mere than a pound each time. Finally the snow hardened so that we were able to walk on it and we made our way to a place in the valley called Brown's ranch, where we had plenty of beef to est until spring."

Mr. Voshay naturally had many encounters with the Indians of a much more serious un-ture than that in which he lost his looking glass. He carries several built scars and more autographs of the noble red man which were made by flint arrow heads. were made by flint arrow heads.

One of the bullet wounds has left a deep depression above the left knee. This was received in an attempt to quiet the Indians in 1857. For continuous deeds of plunder and murder the settlers organized a company and began a systematic warfare on them.
