An Indian Woman Protests Against Rank Favoritism. Philadelphia Press: A bright young Indian woman in the current number of Woman's Work for Woman gives a graphic picture of life at Pine Ridge, among the former hostiles, and gives as a reason for all the Indian woes and wars "the persistent misunderstanding of these people by the whites and the government." Among the bad methods in vogue she explaines is the vacillating treatment. "Today the Indian is treated like a child and a pauper. Tomorrow he is consulted as if he were an educated intelligent man capable of directing the affairs of the nation. The poor old chiefs who are superstitious and ignorant are set above the younger and more intelligent men, who, with proper recognition from the gov-ernment, would advance much more rapidly than they now do. It is a sad comment on our system when an Indian

says he must do something bad to re-ceive recognition." The reason for this complaint lies in the fact that about eight hundred hostiles are said to be maintained in case at Rosebud, faring better than the peaceful Indians. The writer says that the Dakotas are still sore in the heart over their defeat last winter, and some still look for a Messiah. The that the hostiles are "recognized," as it were; must indeed be galling to the better class of Indians who have always been peaceful and interested in the progress of their own race. If such a policy is pursued at the agencies it certainly is most suicidal and short-sighted one. It is, in effect, like giving the enfant terrible, the incorrigible, all he asks for to keep him quiet, while the naturally good child is ignored. Such a system works havoc in a family, and will have the same effect in our dealings with the

If the cold shoulder is to be given to these wards of the nation by means let it be turned tard the semi-savage host and ghost dancers, who should be made to feel on all occasions that the great father does not love the shiftless braves, but the peaceful soil tillers who live after the manner of the whites and have cattle upon the hills and gardens

about their homes This young Indian woman is positive that the policy of those at the agencies will only breed trouble by giving the nostiles an overweening idea of their relative importance, so that they will look upon an outbreak as the only means of gaining "recognition," which seems to mean, as much as anything, more rations.
