Six Thousand Acres to Be Devoted to Factories of Various Kinds and to Homes for the

years hence you will have a city on either side the line, not of 5,000 inhabitants, but a city of 200,000 inhabitants in its full progress, making its most rapid strides to again double its population-miles of factories along the shores of Pelican, and your numerous lines of road-motor lines twenty-five miles in the country, concecting your lesser lakes with your larger ones and girding like colling serpents, Lake Kampeska, mak ing every foot of her shores valuable for residences and resorts; the largest smelters of the world along your belt line, which connects all your railroads as one. With thirty railroads instead of eight coming and departing from one great union depot, between Capitol hiii and the Arcade hotel with their roundhouses and shops on their separate lines. I see on Capitol hill a park as beautiful as the South gardens of old Thebes, or the terraced banks of the Elesian fields, dedicated forever to the pleasure of youth and age during hours of enjoyment, rich in fountains, flowers, groves and lawns fit for heavenly Madonnas or angel lovers, with the drives and walks, whether in squares or circles, all leading to the shores of Kampeska or to the busy centers of your ambittous city. A city, Mr. Chairman, you will all be proud of, a city South Dakota will be proud of, as you will be proud of South Da-kota—a city and state the country will be proud of, every country upon the face of the globe which takes pride in industry, pros-perity, beauty and wealth, a city which will be represented in her products by every car which speeds its way through the earth and by every sail which whitens the waters of

"I know," said World's Fair Commissioner McIntyro at the Grand Pacific, "that we people of Dakota have the reputation of being boomers. In the present instance, however, we have something much more substantial than mere 'boom' back of us. A purchase has just been made of 6,000 acres in and immediately adjoining Watertown for \$600,000. The purchase was made by the Watertown land and improvement company and the object is to build up there a great manufacturing center which will be of vast importance to the whole northwest. South Dakota is fast becoming one of the richest states in the west. Watertown is situated in the rich and fertile Sioux valley, a section 150 miles wide by 300 in length, which has never been injured by drouth since the set-tlement of the state. In addition to her tin, her gold and her silver South Dakota is rich in grains and fibres and agricultural products generally, and these will be utilized by the factories which will be erected on this 6,000 acres. The raw materials are abundant, but manufacturers to work them are scarce. Woolen mills, worsted goods mills, shoe and starch factories and straw board mills will make vastly more profit in South Dakota than they could possibly in the east, simply because the materials for manufacture he as the very door. Think of this until the admission of Idaho the infant state of America vielding 22,000,000 bushels of wheat, 10,000,000 bushels of oats, 4,000,000 bushels of 5,000,000 bushels of flax seed, 25,000,000 bushels of corn, 3,000,000 bushels of potatoes, and other vegetables in proportion, 10,000,000 pounds of wool, 15,000,000 head of horses,

The territory immediately surrounding Watertown is among the richest in the state and we already have eight reilroads, without having a dollar given them er a franchise of any kind. It was the natural and railroad advantages combined that induced such men as George Van Dyke of Lancaster, N. H., president of the Boston & Maine road, and J. P. Ceek of Cook, Jones & Co of Salem to invest their money there. I have been a resident of Watertown for a groat many years, and for ten of them I have worked to bring this thing about, We are connected directly by our railroads with Duluth on the north, Minneapolis and St. Paul on the east, Chicago southeast, Omaha south, the sheep prairies of Wyoming southwest, Bis-marck, the Northern Pacific, with its tributaries, northwest and the Black Hills, the center of American tin and the center of many of the largest gold and silver mines in the country on the west. Such is our rail road competition that we can ship our products to the eastern states and to Europe as cheaply as they can be shipped from Minne-apolis, although we are 226 miles west of Min-

neapolis. "Now, we intend to have a city of mills and factories, sufficient to take care of our grain and fibre; woolen mills for our wool linen mills for our flax, straw board mills for the millions of tons of straw we annually waste; tamerics and shoe fac-tories for our hides, starch factories for our potatoes and sugar mills for our beets. We intend to manufacture the products we grow as we grow them instead of freighting them 2,000 miles east to be manufactured and then have the manufactured goods shipped back to us. It is the same principle which has brought Armeur and Swift and the other great packers nearer the field of supply each year and which has made Omaha within a very short time the second pork packing cen-ter of the United States. Denverhas become a great city and the pride of Colorado, but her mountains made her grest. Omaha is the glory of Nebraska, but her prairies and the prairies of the west made her glorious Wichita is the wonder of the south central states, but her railroads made her famous. Watertown has the mountains of Denver the prairies of Omaha and the railroads of Wichita, all contributing to her future

"In the transaction which has just been consummated many of New England's most prominent business men are concerned, asso-ciated with strong interests in the middle and western states, with railroads in the deal. Arrangements have been made for the building of numerous factories and mills mmediately and before winter sets in we will have a city equipped for a steady march of years. We will have 1,000 more property nolders than we have today. The Water-town land and improvement company has been organized by men of brains and experience, backed by unlimited capital. Our capital stock at present is \$2,000,000, all of which is taken. Four of the eight railroads entering the city are interested in the

Some idea of the magnitude of the enterprise may be formed when it is stated that the company has purchased nearly half the town corporation, including 18,000 city lots, 3,000 acres adjacent to the city and controlling the water of both lakes, the Watertown and Lake Kampeska railroad and the exclusive rights from the city of Watertown for the next twenty years to build, own and operate all the horse, steam, electric and motor lines.

"Twenty-four horses and a large force of men are already at work laying off and grad-ing the streets in the outside property," said Mr. McIntyre, "and there are several fac-tories prepared to locate just as soon as we can get ready for them. One of them is a paper mill, which will turn into wrapping and building paper the 25,000 tons of straw which is burned every year within a radius of twelve miles of Watertown, another is a liuseed oil mill, which will use up the flax seed, 500,000 bushels of which was raised this year in Coddington counts; another is a this year in Coddington count; another is a woolen mil, which will weave into cloth the fleece of 1,000,000 sheep raised within forty miles of Watertown and employ 200 hands, and a fifth is a starch factory which is now signing contracts for 500,000 bushels of potaces to be delivered a year from October and
