

Scheme Until Jay Gets Back.

Nothing Can Be Done on the Union Pacific

MORGAN WANTS TO NAME THE PRESIDENT

Said to Bave Selected Samuel Spencer to Succeed Dillon-Nobody Can as Yet Predict the Probable Outcome.

New York, Aug. 26.-The Times says: The hitch in the financial scheme by which the enormous floating debt of the Union Pacific railway is to be extended for three years, is believed to be due to uncertainty concerning Mr. Jay Gould's purpose in the matter. That financier is expected to reach home from the west next week, and soon after his arrival it is predicted Union Pacific affairs will begin to move.

The present understanding in Wall street is that J. Pierpout Morgan consented to act as trustee in the proposed fund raising scheme only after exacting from Russell Sage, Sidney Dillon and George Gould concessions of great importance to the road. One of these concessions, it is believed, was the presidency of the road, and some of the knowing ones in this city insist that Mr. Morgan has selected his able lieutenant, Samuel Spencer to succeed President Dillon. In their eagerness to avert a receivership Gould himseif, knows just what Mr. Gould wants to do with Union Pacific. It is related that a young broker accosted Mr. Morgan in his private office and asked him what Mr. Gould's intentions were in the matter of the Union Pacific. Mr. Morgan promptly

replied: "My dear sir, there are a great many men in Wall street who would gladly give \$100,-000 cash to know with certainty just what Mr. Gould's intentions are." Under the agreement by which Mr. Morgan

is to take charge of the floating debt extension, the Union Pacific company is expected to issue about \$24,000,000 in three-year 6 per cent notes. These notes are to be secured by the entire Union Pacific treasury, which includes stocks and bonds of a par value of \$98,503,465 and an estimated value of \$42,105,-047.

SHORT LINE BIDDERS.

Nebraska's New Railroad Will Be Eagerly Gobbled Up.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 26,-The Pacific Short Line will be offered for sale at public auction next Tuesday under foreclosure proceedings, by order of the United States circuit court. It is expected that there will be a sharp contest for the possession of the property as several companies are known to have a covctous eye for it for some time and will make the most of this opportunity to secure it. Among the bidders, it is understood, will be the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, the Chicago & Northwestern and the Central Illinois companies, besides syndicates of original bond-holders. In railroad circles much interest has been manifested in the Pacific Short Line project from the first.

It was originally an Illinois Central scheme but was abandoned by that company and afterwards taken up by the Wyoming Im-provement company. The intention was to build a line from Sioux City to Oguen par-alleling the Union Pacific and shortening the distance by several hundred miles from the Missouri river to the Pacific coast. Sioux City men added \$1,000,000 to the amount that was put into the enterprise by the eastern capitalist. The whole line was urveyed and laid out. Three different companies were incorporated and 130 miles of the road between Sioux City and O'Neill, Neb., had been constructed and put into motion. The enterprise looked promising enough until the financial panie of last fall, after

which the outlook was changed.

Jay Gould had gobbled the Union Pacific and was understood to be hand in glove with Huntington who controlled the Central Pacific. The latter road which is the outlet from Ogden to the Pacific coast was in hostile hands and the Pacific Short Line de-cided it would be folly to complete that line under the circumstances. The property was and is now to be sold by order of the court The Illinois Central is said to be anxious gain access to the Black Hills territory, If it should fall into the hands of the North western it may ultimately be completed to Ogden, if not actually extended to the Pa-cific coast. The Milwaukee would like to control the line because it traverses a rich agricultural section and taps the Wyoming oil and coal fields, insuring a profitable source of revenue for the company that

operates it.
The charge was denied by the latter company and a counter one brought against the Rock Island for malicious prosecution. The chairman acquitted the Santa Fe and found the Rock Island guilty, and an appeal was

Special commissioners representing the Central Traffic association, the Western Passenger association and the Onio river lines will have a conference in this city tomorrow concerning the adjusting of passenger rates from Cincinnati to the Pacific coast, A readjustment of these rates has been asked with a view to doing away with certain inequalities that are complained of by some of the lines in interstate.

A board of arbitration composed of General Passenger Agents J. Francis of the B. & M., W. E. Davis of the Chicago & Grand Trunk and C. S. Fee of the Northern Pacific nave been in session today hearing evidence and arguments in the appeal of the Rock Island from the decision of Chairman Finley fining it \$100 for mailcious prosecution of the Santa Fe. The case is one in which the Rock Island made a charge against the Santa Fe for doing a broker business.

Not Enough Cars.

Sr. Louis, Mo., Aug. 26.-All St. Louis roads are complaining of a shortage of freight cars. It is because they cannot obtain possession of their own property. Many small roads and especially in the cotton belt and throughout the south have on their tracks cars belonging to the trunk lines which they state they will not be able to return or ignore all demands for their restoration.
