The bids were as follows: W. F. Rice, \$140 per booth; J. W. McDonald, \$180, with \$25 additional for floors; Newman, Hansen & Johnson, \$190; A. Rosenberg, \$160; J. Cain, \$150; C. W. Partridge, \$157; Gus Andrews, \$225.

THESE HAVE BEEN MISSED.

The county and state taxes that have never been collected. The state law provides that each year the county clerks of the several counties shall prepare a list showing the uncollectable tax and transmit the same to the state auditor, that a proper credit may be given on the books and the amount stricken off.

Prior to this year this has never been done in Douglas county and since 1850 the amounts have been piling up. Now the books at Lincoln show that Douglas county owes the state \$49,988.90. One year ago county clerk C. M. Mayle took the matter in hand and went to work upon the books. He has just completed the following table which shows the amount of uncollectable tax for each year:

The above list will be transmitted and after the cancellation has been made, Douglas county will owe to the state \$24,000.00. The following table shows the amount of delinquent taxes on real estate for the years 1881 to 1888, inclusive, for which the county treasurer may be allowed credit.
