

Experts Begin Inspecting Pork for Ex-

port at South Omaha. Inspector R. S. Forbes, assisted by "Doo" Wilson and Messrs. McGucken, Traynor and Gibson, acting under orders from the Agricultural department began the miscroscopical examination of pork at the Cudahy plant at noon yesterday, in compliance with the act passed at the last session of congress, pro-viding for the examination of domestic pork and appropriating \$200,000 for that purpose,
Dr. Forbes is conducting the examination
personally and D. R. Sears is the assistant.
The pork inspection would have begun
some weeks ago but was delayed by the nonarrival of the necessary apparatus. Work will be begun at the other houses in a few

days.

just as stagnant water gives rise to majaria Rats have triching, hence the virulence of their bite. Some of the scientific men at the wards this morning said that the hogs got their disease from the redents. There is a great deal about the explanation of triening, is given by the scientists, which is an unin-celligible jargon to the unitiated.

Trichinae are almost always found in the pupa state encased in a calcareous envelope quite dormant. In this condition they are innoxious to the hog and may remain so for any length of time. But when the defected meat is taken into the human stomach the meat is taken into the human stomach the gastric juices dissolve the envelope and the parasites therein imbedded begin their mi-gration to the large muscles of their victim. During their march they do such things as pierce the walls of the stomach and aliment ary duct, and claw at the mensentary with its lymphatic network. If they travel upward they pierce the muscular diaphragm and here they have the offensive habit of now and then taking a bite at a man's heart or lungs. From the moment they enter the human body they have but one object, that is to get a good place in which to rest and reconstruct their envelopes, and then they begin to propagate with fearful rapidity. Inflamation sets in and then peritonitis.

This results in death. Thus it will be seen that the parasite is a bad thing to carry around in the human system.

Science in Bread Making. At the recent annual meeting of the American Chemical society, held in Wash-ington, D. C., the question of the value of carbonate of ammonia as a leavening agent in bread, or as used in baking powders came up for discussion, in which Prof. Barker, of the University of Pennsylvania, and president of the society; Dr. Richardson, late of the United States department of agriculture in Washington; Dr. William McMurtrie, late professor of chemistry in the University of Illinois; Dr. E. H. Hartley, late chemist of the Brooklyn, New York, Board of Health, and professor of chemistry of the Long Island college, and others took part. carbonate of ammonia as a leavening agent in

land college, and others took part.

The consensus of opinion was overwhelming in favor of the employment of ammonia. it was stated as a fact that ammonia rendered the gluten of the flour more soluble than the original gluten, and that the bread in which this action was produced by carbonate of ammonia must be more digestible and hence more healthful, and because of the extreme volatility of carbonate of ammonia and its complete expulsion from the bread in the process of baking, it is one of the most useful, most healthful and most valuable leavening

agents known. These conclusions are borne out by the very elaborate and exhaustive experiments made by Prof. J. W.
