Supreme Court Overrules His Motion for a New Trial.

Without Governor Thayer interfering, the murders of Alan and Dorothy Jones must hang October 9.

The supreme court yesterday passed upon the case, and denied the application for a new hearing. The case was argued at the last term, and the motion and the brief filed five weeks ago.

The decision of the supreme court reached the city last night, but the news was not broken to Neal until this morning.

Shortly after 10 o'clock Sheriff Boyd received the official information regarding the decision, and at once proceeded to the jail, where he stepped into the corridor of the murderer's cell. Neal, who was seated upon his iron bedstead, arose and advanced to the door of the cell, and asked, "What is it?"
