FIRST PART GOES ON SALE TOMORROW.

This freight wreck occurred on the Pacific coast.

At a slight curve a cow was noticed lying on the track, but not soon enough for the engineer to stop the train, although he whistled down brakes. The engine and thirteen cars for California were ditched. The engineer miraculously escaped with only slight bruises and cuts. A shoofly track was immediately set around the wreck and trains were soon running regularly.
