

THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS.

Demoralized Condition of the Wires Made Trade Light. WHEAT QUIET, DULL AND MUCH LOWER.

Interest Centered Largely in the Corn Pit and a Considerable Advance Was Secured and Retained.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 24.—Wheat was dull and lower. The light trade was attributed to the demoralized condition of the wires to the east, which cut off both news and orders.

Today it all grew out of the anxiety of the market in that it was yesterday, and it was proceeding and very small available stocks in store here. There was very little of the liberal receipts of contract grain and the market was frantic efforts to buy. But the actual grain was in strong hands and the sellers were disinclined to sell. The result was inevitable.
