

RISE OF YOUNG STATESMEN.

A Look at the Two Senatorial Babies, Hansbrough and Dubois.

NEW blood. New men. The senate which meets on Monday will be practically strange to the people. Half of its members have not been in office more than two years and there are sixteen senators who take their seats in the chamber for the first time.

Some of the brightest of the young men come from the west and two of those are so young that they are hardly out of their short clothes. Dubois of Idaho and Hansbrough of Dakota are the babies of the senate. It is all Dubois can do to raise a mustache, and Hansbrough does not look to be over 30.

Dubois is a younger man than Hansbrough. He weighs twenty pounds less and he is a brunet while Hansbrough is a strawberry blonde. Dubois' parents were well-to-do and he received a good education. He went to school at Yale and he was there noted as an athlete as well as a student.

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Two Ex-Representatives. Senators Blair of New Hampshire and Hearst of California are succeeded by two men who served together in the house of representatives. These are Dr. Gallinger and Mr. Charles Fulton.

Mr. Charles Fulton also started life with nothing and he is now a rich man in that state of rich men, California. This means that he is a millionaire. He owns mining stocks, railroad stocks and bonds and he owns the water works of one of the best suburban towns near San Francisco.

Next to Fulton the richest man of the new members is probably Cal Brice, who represents Ohio but lives in New York. Brice's fortune, however, is a speculative one and he is engaged in so many things that he does not know himself just how rich he is.

Foster, who is now secretary of the treasury, was then the chief executive of Ohio, and Brice and he were building the Ohio Central railroad. They finished it, but I don't think it paid until they ran it into the coal fields. Then the stock took a turn and Brice was able to pay his debts and to clear more than \$100,000.

Senator David B. Hill has selected his winter quarters at Washington. He will live just over where Charles Sumner used to hold forth and just across the street from where President Madison lived after he left the white house. His quarters are bachelor ones and his hotel is the Arlington. Hill will be one of the great characters of the senate.

Peffer and Kyle. The two Simon-pure alliance senators are, however, Senator Peffer of Kansas and Senator Kyle of South Dakota. Both of these men have gotten to the senate by being constitutional hickers. They have run their campaigns on the big league basis and have made votes by pleading poverty and mortgages.

Senator Gibson's Appointment. Another curious appointment was that of Senator Gibson of Maryland. Gibson has been in congress for several terms and he was about to open a campaign as a candidate for the clerkship of the present house when he received a note from Senator Gorman asking him to call at his house before 9:30 o'clock one morning.

Governors Gordon and Palmer. Hill is not the only ex-governor among the new senators. General Gordon has been twice governor of Georgia and General John M. Palmer was once the chief executive of Illinois. Both served with credit in the late war and Palmer came out of it a major-general, having been in some of the noted battles and having started in as a colonel.

Senator David of Florida has been in the lower house of congress for years. He is a man of fair average ability but with none of the elements of great statesmanship or great oratory about him. He is well educated and during the late unpleasantness he won his spurs on the confederate side entering the service as a captain and coming out a lieutenant colonel.

Great Men from the Cabinet. The two ex-cabinet officers who come trotting into the senate will probably attract considerable attention. Proctor is as mild a man as ever cut an office but he is fresh from the great department of war and there is fire in his eye. Vilas has been digesting his postal schemes in the long walks which
