CYRUS BLENKARN OFF STACE,

Actor Willard Chats Entertainingly with a Bae Raporter.

METHODS THAT MAKE UP HIS ART.

Some of His Peculiarities and Points of Difference from Conventional Actors - Short Sketch

of His Life.

Mr. E. S. Willard, the English actor, who has just closed an engagement in "The Middleman" at the Boyd theater, is rated by the critics as one of the greatest contemporary players, and he has a personality of more

than passing interest. He had just finished his "morning tub" when a representative of THE BER called on him at the Millard, and was sitting down to a center table thickly strewn with correspondence and other private papers. The appearance of the room was characteristic, Two trunks, a valise and scattered papers indicated a temporary sojourn, and yet the occupant had taken time to deck the ornamental mantelpiece with photographs of numerous prfoessional friends, suggestive of a pretty sentiment. Over the back of a sofa was spread a big map of the United States, and black pencil marks indicated the cities in which the actor was to play.

Mr. Willard's appearance would arrest attention anywhere. The head is leoning, a suggestion which is carried out the flowing locks. The face is characterful and its lines mobile. The actor is an entertaining conversationalist, with a charm of manner

one cannot help being forcibly impressed with the fact that Mr. Willard's delineation of Cyrus Blenkarn, the lovatic old potter in "The Middleman," is free from the usual artifices of theatrical makeup. His long hair, already streaked with gray is nowdered. hair, already streaked with gray, is powdered to heighten the appearance of age, and that

### "Makeup" is Subordinate.

"I do not believe in much makeup for head

and face," said the distinguished actor in response to a query. "A player's effectiveness should come from what he gets out of himself and not from what he puts on himself. Whenever an actor's appearance leads the audience to remark, 'That is a clever make-up,' that moment is attention divided and the performer's art demeaned. I appeared in four plays last season and in none of them did I wear wig or false beard. In 'John Needham's Double,' I had a dual role, and the only difference in my make-up was a finger ring. I wore evening dress for both characters, but their dissimilar feelings were brought out by the art of expression, and could hear veople in the boxes, the instant I stepped from the wings, tell each other which character I represented."

Mr. Willard was asked why he refused to respond to the demands of enthusiastic audiences with curtain calls. "No, that's not an English peculiarity," in response to an intimation of that kind. "I is called a Willardism neross the water. It came about in this way: When I was a stock actor I writhed under the practice of dragging a company before the curtain in a procession to work up a climax of enthusiasm for the star. I determined then that if I ever came into control of a company I would not permit curtain calls urtil the end of the play. The innovation excited some comment, but it is accepted now as a matter of course, and i rather think it meets with general faver. There is abother thing to be considered. When on actor interrupts the action of a play to assume his private individuality, it makes a break in the illusion and mars the completeness of his characterization. Of course the applause of an audience is grateful to every actor, but it seems to me to be much more in harmony with dramatic art to show a continuation of the action of the play than to step before the curtain as private John Smith or Thomas Brown."

### His Idea of Advertising. This is Mr. Willard's first tour west of

Chicago and it was intimated that he came as a stranger. "Oh, well, I'm not surprised at tnat," he said. "London is a long way from Omaha, I found that New York, Boston and Chicago each made up its own judgment without reference to the other's opinion, and I presume Omaha does the same. Americans have treated me very generously and I have always been favored with increased audiences after the first night. I presume if I carried a boa constructor and occasionally let it escape on the crowded streets people would hear a great deal of me through the press. Or, if I refused to ride from railway stations to hotels except in a coach that I transported with me, and gave it out that that vehicle was the identical hearse used at the funerals of Garrick and Keane, probably the newspapers would keep the public fully informed about me. I really have no reason

to compiain, though, and am young enough not to regret the time spert in making the acquaintance of the American people. "I am looking forward to the trip across the continent with much interest," he continued, stepping across the room to the map. "We go from Omaha to Kansas City and jump thence to San Francisco." He ran a finger along the line of the Union

Pacific and out in Nevada struck a station called Willard's. "Its the oidest thing how the Willards bob up at almost every turn I make in this country. Here is a book," stepping to an open trunk, "containing a history of the Willard family in America. It was presented to me in Boston. When I started on this tour I reduced my books to five, but the temptation to buy more is irresistable, and there is the result," waving his hand toward

the trank. The top tray was packed with Ralfe's Shakespeare, Swinburne's poems, a

variety of classical works and a few paper covered volumes, the books standing on edge. Not All Fancy.

Referring to "The Miduleman" the actor "Cyrus Blenkarn is not wholly a work of fancy. Before producing it in London I spent three months among the potters at Stoke-Upon-Trent. For several weeks I practically lived among the class of people of whom Blenkarn is a representative, visiting them in their homes and factories, and make ing a study of their characteristics. One of my most interesting performances was 'Pot-ter's Night' in London, when persons con-nected with the ceramic art came from all parts of England to attend the entertain-

It is a matter of record that shortly after this performance the Potters' Benevolent association received Mr. Willard's check for \$750, though the actor modestly suppressed that feed this afternoon that fact this afternoon.
"That reminds me of a special performance of 'Judah' to an audience of 700 persons com-

posed of clorgymen and their families. The play hinges upon the claim of a woman to cure disease by faith. 'Judah' is a clergyman who falls in love with this woman and discovers that she is an imposter. The play brings about a situation in which the young clergyman is compelled to tell a falsehood to shie'd the woman he loves or to expose her duplicity by stating the truth. He tells the lie. The press criticised the moral of the play, and I gave a special matinee for ciergy-men to test their sentiment. After the critical moment had passed there was a brief hush in the house, and then the elerical audience broke out into the heartlest ap-plause and demanded a curtain call. have bever found anyone who did not justify 'Judah,' clergymen though he is, in telling the lie to protect, his sweetheart. 'Judah' was advertised for Omaha through some mistake, but I hope to play it here on my return from the Pacific coast."

Willard as a Villain.

Mr. Willard was associated with Wilson Barrett several years ago and won dis-tinction playing villain roles. When the matter was mentioned he said: "Yes, they

tell me I was quite diabolical."
"But you don't look like a villain"
"No." replied the actor, "I believe I don't.
And I think that is one reason why I was And I think that is one reason why I was successful. Your villain who looks like a villain is understood at once and is quically tripped up. But your villain who looks and acts like a gentleman has the advantage of being unsuspected and is able to work much mischief. Shakespeare understood this perfectly when he wrote lago. He wasn't at all like a villain; he was the exact reverse. In fact he was so guileless and frank for manner, so thoroughly honest, seemingly, that people went around saying of him what an honest chap that lago is.' And so, you see, he worked wonders And so, you see, he worked wonders as a villain. My ideal villain is a man who appears to bubble over with the milk of human kindness, whose smile is so genial and warming that people are glad to seek him out and confide in him; a man to whom children will be attached, and for whose tenderness of heart and large sympathy every-body will vouch. This sort of man may do anything if he is brainy enough and unscrupulous enough. You see, I believe that auditors should be treated as reasonable beings, and if you don't present a characterization which they feel would have deceived them, how can you expect them to have anything but contempt for the play folks who are by it deceived?"
