PUNERAL OF FRED WHITNEY.

Railroad Men Perform the Last Rites

for a Worthy Brother. St. Paut, Minn., Dec. 7 .- | Special to THE BEE.]-The remains of the late Fred B. Whitney, first assistant general freight agent of the Union Pacific road, who died in Omaha last Saturday morning, were laid to rest in Oakland, cemetery, St. Paul, this af-

The deceased had been born in this city. He was educated here and here, too, he first became connected with the railroad business and he experienced his first preferment.

It was in accordance with professional courtesy and protherly love, therefore, when, as the remains passed through the large cities on their way to this place, that large delegations of former fellow railroad men were ready on the platforms to pay the de ceased, in various ways, the respect towed him, both as a friend and associate.

It was fitting also that on the arrival of the remains in this city, they should be met by men distinguished in his profession though in no way connected with the road on which the deceased had achieved his greatest suc cess. Among the latter were Superintendent McCabe of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha, who had formerly represented the same road in Omaha. H. C. Hope, super intendent of telegraph of the same road: A W. Trenholm, local freight agent; H. P. Upham, uncle of the deceased and president of the First National bank and W. H. Wright general purchasing agent of the Chicago, St Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha.

There was also present a large number of the employes of the latter road who stood with uncovered heads in a piercing blast while the remains were being removed from the cars to the hearse in waiting.

The floral tributes both from Omaha

and the larger cities enroute, filled three carriages, the most notable of those received along the nne being from the Union Pacific employes at Sioux City. I consisted of a large floral harp and appended to it were the names of D. M. Collins, general agent of the Union Pacific at that place; George E. Abbott, passenger traveling agent; H. M. Birdsall, city ticket agent and William

M. Enright.
The remains were borne to the residence of the bereaved mother, Mrs. H. M. (Whitney) Ober, 281 Goodrich avenue, and were accompanied thither by the floral tributes from Omahs, Denver, Kansas City, Grand Island, St. Joe, Sioux City and Salt Lake. Mrs. Ober was accompanied to her residence by Mr. J. A. Munroe, general freight agent of the Union Pacific, who had

always been an ardent admirer and warm personal friend of the deceased. Mrs. Ober was accompanied by her sister, Mrs. H. P. Upham, Mrs. J. A. Muuroe and Mrs. D. M. Collins. At 1:30 o'clock p. m. the friends from abroad, as also the local railroad nien, met at the Merchants and were driven to the late

residence of the deceased, where the remain At the head and foot of the casket were placed the floral cars of the freight depart-ments at Kansas City and Omaha, while upon the lid lay a number of floral clusters already described in The Bre. Near the glass plate stood the two broken wheels, the offerings respectively of the lard hotel at Omaha and Mr. Mil S. Meilen, while adjacent rested the beautiful floral anchor from the general freight department at Denver. On a special stand beside the casket stood the exquisite broken column, the tribute of Messrs. Frank P. Hanlen and Frank Muir of Omaha. In a corner lay the large floral pillow, sent by the Kunses City club; in another a floral wheel from friends in the general office of the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolts & Omaha in St. Paul, together with a collection of floral designs from old-time friends in this city, the number and variety of which preclude the possibility of enumerating them here. Suffice it to say that every available space in the parior was occupied with flowers. The grateful odor exhaled from them was not more sweet than was the es-teem in which the donors held the deceased in life.

At 3 o'clock a quartette sang with intense emotion, "Brief Life is Here Our Portion," Then Rev. Mr. Butterick offered a fervent prayer especially intended to console the bereaved mother and encouraging her to place her hope and confidence in the Savier rather than in man. The quartette then sang "Lead, Kindly Light," when Rev. Mr. Butterick made short and eloquent address.

The quartette then sang "Paradise" atte which the visiting and local friends took a ast view of the placid features of the de-The casket was then enclosed and borne to the hearse. The latter was driven after the fifteen carriages containing the gentlemen from abroad and after it came thirty more

carriages containing the railroad and other friends of cf the deceased from St. Paul and other cities. The pail bearers were W. H. S. Wright, R. W. Clark, H. M. Pearce, A. W. Tren-holm, George Hunsiker and H. C. Hope. The headquarters of the Union Pacific throughout the country were closed at noon out of respect to the occasion and the papers of the city have united in deservedly culogi-zing him as a man and a railroad official.
