Meeting of the World. Omaha marksmen who belong to the Western Schuetzenbund of North America are considerably enthused over the prospects of having a great tournament open to the world in Omaha in June, 1893.

The national tournament of all the schuetzen vereins of this country will be held in Omaha at that time and a great crowd will doubtless attend. An effort will be made, however, to make this of an inter-national nature by opening a world wide competition separate from the regular national competitions. Prizes will be offered ranging from \$500 to \$3,000 in this world wide competition and it is expected that the inducements will be such as to attract hundreds of prominent marksmen from all parts of Europe as well as America.

A separate shooting range will be built for this free-for-all match and the national and free-for-all competitions will be held at the same time. It will require the outlay of not less than \$30,000 to provide grounds, targets, pits and shooting pavilions for the great tournament, but the energetic citizens of Omaha who have taken hold of the matter are determined to make it a complete success. They expect to purchase ten acres of land outright and fit it up for the purposes of per-manent shooting tournament grounds. They expect to spend not less than \$5,000 upon en-

tertainment for the delegates.

It is the intention to send delegates to several of the European tournaments this coming year to work up an interest in the Omaha gathering. Output of Norfolk's Eest Sugar Factory Was Highly Satisfactory.

IMPORTANCE OF THIS ENTERPRISE.

Town-Its Employment of Labor -Greater Inducements Of-

fered Farmers.

Attention of Thousands Drawn to the

Nonpole, Neb., Dec. 15.—[Special to Tun Ber.]—Norfolk's great beet sugar plant, which has been in operation since the first of last October, recently completed its run, though it could have been operated six or eight days tonger had not the unexpected cold snap frozen so many beets in the ground, Machinists and workmen are now actively engaged in cleaning up the machinery, loosening joints, and doing such work as will preserve and prepare the plant for its next campaign.

Hundreds and thousands of people have visited this factory during its campaign, and this thriving, active, wide awake little city bids fair to become one of the most important points in the state. Its citizens have shown their shrewdness and business tact in having secured an industry in their locality that must in due time reward them richly for their energy. Surrounding towns have noticed this during the past summer, when the beet culture and demand for labor has attracted people to Norfelk, giving every one employment, making the merchants, bankers, hotels, and in fact everyone, feel the benefit of the building and the running of the sugar factory.

The company has advertised in some ten of the surrounding towns for contracts during the coming season, and one town alone has sent them over 200 acres in contracts. These contracts are necessary for the farmer as well as for the company, enabling the lat-ter to know when it has enough acreage con-tracted for, when the books will be closed and no more contracts will be taken. To the farmer it is equally important, so he may know he is not planting a crop for which there is no market, but has some reliable in stitution to take it from him when it is ready for market.

Offering Great Inducements. The company has also increased its price,

and offers to the producers of beets two dis-tinct contracts. One offers to the producer \$1 straight for any beets that will polarize 12 per cent, saccharine matter, with a purity coefficienct of 80 per cent; or, a contract which gives to the producer \$3 for a beet that contains 12 per cent saccharine matter with a purity coefficiency of \$0, and 50 cents (instead of 25 cents as last year) for each and every 1 per cent of saccharine matter contained in the beet over 12 per cent. This gives the farmer for a 16 per cent beet \$5 a ton, and for an 18 per cent beet \$6 a ton. Beets polarized a. Grand Island last year 21 per cent, and this year at Norfolk, as high as 7 per cent, it being a poor year for sugar in the beet, as it requires a hot and dry sum-

mer.
A large number of acres have already been subscribed to by the farmers surrounding Norfolk and other towns, demonstrating that a plant of this magnitude does not only help the particular town in which it is located, but for twenty-five to fifty miles surrounding it contracts have been and are being made.
The tounage obtained around Norfolk

varies. Where the land is poor and too sandy the results have been exceedingly unsatisfactory. This is accounted for by some as resulting from the bad weather, but by the best experts of the sugar factory it is stated that it is exceedingly unwise to try to produce or ever plant beets on poor soil. Where the land has been of good quality, and there is abundance of it around Norfolk, and the farmer has been of a thrifty kind, he has produced from fifteen to twenty-seven tons to the acre, and in a number of in-stances some sixty odd tons were the result of three acres, averaging \$4 a ton, which, under the new contract, would give the farmer a handsome yield from three acres of beets.

Prospects for Next Year.

Between 25,000 and 35,000 acres will be planted in beets during the coming year; 4,000 for the Norfolk plant, 4,000 for Grand Island, while 7,000 acres will be planted for a plant owned by the same company in Cali fornia, where, owing to the open season, they can run for six months, and where plowing has already commenced; and the other acreage will be put in for the other compan-ies at Watsonville, Alvarado and Utah, so that the thinking farmer can see what rapid

strides this industry is making.

The Norfolk plant has produced some 1,300,000 pounds of the finest sugar, commanding the highest prices and having been sold wherever the best market was afforded.
