## THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Wheat Was Dull and Weak at the Start Yesterday.

WERE QUITE BEARISH DFFERINGS

War News Cut No Figure on the Board-Pardridge Was a Generous Seller Early in the Session-Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 27.-Wheat was dull and weak at the start this morning. There was no fresh war news to stimulate it and cables were rather easy with domestic markets tend-ing downward. Speculation was dull with the offerings generous and the tone of trade was for a time upmistakably bearish. A good many bulls of yesterday who had carried property over, notwithstanling yesterday's weakness, seeme I to feel that they had made a mistake and sold freely today. "English George" Smith, who had taken on a good line uoring the last few days, was reported to have put it on the market this morning and was followed by many of the smaller operators. Pardridge wrs also a generous seller early in the session, putting out a good line through Cutler and others. The report of Secretary Mohler of the Kansas Board of Agriculture estimating last year's erop at 5,000,010 bu. more than estimated by the government statistican and putting the acreage for next year at an increase of 25 per cent, helped along the depression as did private cables quoting prices lower.

Pardridge quickly turned buyer and the crowd followed and for a time there was quite a stramble to get back the wheat dumped early and May rose easily to 92c. Then cardridge turned again and led a viclous selling raid. Late cables quoting declines at London, Liverpool and Paris helped the down turn and a large amount of long wheat came out on the break which followed, May going down to 90% cand the cose was easy at 91c.

Corn was quiet today, but was rather firm during the forenoon on rood buying by one or two prominent houses and some covering by shorts. There were no new features to affect values to any extent. May opened unchanged at 40c, advanced to 40% c, weakened some in the afternoon and closed steady at 41% c.

Oats were firm on good covering by shorts and better outside demand; offerings were light. The close shows prices unchanged.

Hog products were easier on the larger receipts of hogs than expected and lower prices at the yards. There were some weak railies during the session, but the general tendency was downward and the close was at or near the bottom. Final Changes in the List Are of No Special Significance. New York, Jan 27. - The stock market again showed considerable strength on spots while an increased volume of business was transacted, but the final changes in the list are, with but few exceptions, of no special significance and prices are about where they were last night. That there still exists a large demanu for stocks is without doubt and while the room traders are fighting the improvement, stocks are passing into strong hands. As the supply of stocks diminishes the institutions and individuals who are large lenders of money are the most active buyers of securtutions and individuals who are large lenders of money are the most active buyers of securities. The story that two large insurance companies have been large buyers of Lackawanna obtained much credence on the street today and the demand from smaller investors was again sufficient to cause a 3 percentrise in the stock, but it was afterwards offered heavily by a prominent trader and the resultant decline was accompanied by rumors of a settlement with the shorts. Manhattan continued its upward movement, fairly rivaling Lackawanna in the forenoon and was followed later by Western Union. The weak point in the list was Louisville & Nashville, which reflected the early selling for foreign account and it was the only stock which finally showed a material loss for the day. Reading was again heavily traded in and followed Lackawanna at a distance, both up and down, and like the latter closed unchanged from last night. In the afternoon new buying of a pronounced character appeared in the grangers and Burlington took the lead in the upward movement for a time and it retained the greater part of the gain at the close. The buying was largely for Boston houses. Among the low priced shares Louisville, New Albany & Chicago was again very consoleuous for its activity and strength but it stood alone in this respect, the others being quiet and traded in within the narrowest limits. The industrials were strong but quiet throughout. A decline of 2% per cent in Richmonu & West Point preferred attracted attention but a portion of it was regained and the stock, while lower, shows only a fractional loss.

The market opened with heavy pressure from the foreigners and prices were all lower. Louisy, lie boing down % per cent, but the demand developed in the leading shares brought the general list without causing any marked movements outside of the few stocks mentioned, and this strength with frequent fluctuations in temper lasted until well into the afternoon, when the weakening of the coalers let the rest of the list off and the early gains were generally wiped completely out. New York. Jan. 27.—The Post says: Silver builion touched today, both in London and New York, the lowest price ever reached—a melancholy comment on the foresight of those authorities who devoted themselves last fall to arguments that a great advance in the quotations was at hand. The closing price for the certificates yesterday was 9136 per ounce. In the first hour of today's business unward of 300,000 ounces were sold at 91c, the sales proceeding almost wholly from the brokers for the largest western smelting company. This price represents a decline of 134c since the opening of this year and 32c from the top price of the market boom in 1899. The movement of our silver market may be accepted as significant, not only financially, but politically; for the producers of silver are uniformly the best posted men in this country on the plans of congressional colonage committees. London agents bourht enough of the silver on today's decline to raily the price fractionally, but acted with their usual cautious conservatism. The plain truth about the world's silver market is that while our own country is flooding the market by its overproduction India is learning to buy silver only for its occasional balance of exchange and no European government buys for coinage purposes except on a sharp decline.

The calf market was not adequately supplied and was stronger—quoted at from \$2.50 to \$5.25.

The advance gained during Monday and Tuesday in the hog market was about all lost today. Late arrivals swelled yesterday's supply, which was estimated at 35,00 head, to over 41,000 head, and as today's arrivals amounted to about 45,000 head, buyers experienced little trouble in foreing prices back a couple of points. The best heavy grades receded to \$4.60 and the best light to \$4.60—a decline of 1.00 per 100 lbs. Poor mixed and common light sold around \$1.25 and common heavy grades at from \$4.35 to \$4.40. At that range of prices the market was active and closed fairly stendy, but few hogs being carried over. The quality was about the poorest of the season.

Rather more than the usual activity was seen in the sheep pens. There was an increase in the eastern orders, and compet tion between local and eastern buyers was strong enough to give prices an upward inclination. 
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
