There were five indictments against Pul-

aski. He is charged with having made false returns to the city of the number of dogs returns to the city of the number of dogs killed by him for the months of April, May, June, July and August, 1890. For those five months he collected pay for killing 2,428 dogs, whereas it is claimed that he killed in fact but 777 canines. He was held under bonds of \$1,000 on each indictment and went to init in default of control of the control of t ment and went to jail in default of surety.

Gavin was charged with having set fire to

his book store on Cuming street in February last and was piaced under bonds of \$1,000 He was unable to furnish the required ball There are four more indictments yet in the hands of the sheriff. Two of these are against non-residents and the other two will not be served for some time yet for reasons

known to the authorities.



The Bostonian's Every Day Life Sprinkled With the Rarest of Comedy. Mr. H. C. Barnabee, of the Bostonians and Mr. Jules Lumbard met yesterday, tried to outdo each other in narrating reminiscences and new stories and then adjourned to the Millard hotel billiard room to determine which was the greater artist with-the cue. The delightful comedian was bubbling that was as unstudied as it was amusing.

over with happy spirits, and the spectators were entertained with a diverting by-play A good shot was emphasized with a bit of cleeful clog dancing or the humming of a bar of music; a failure was followed with a look of incredulous amazement, and all the time the big bass singer was being rallied about insisting on a four-ball game. ton, and at St. Paul I saw almost as many in the boxes."

Mention was made of Mrs. Smith, a mutual friend, who gave promise of a great career as a singer until marriage ended it. "There is an illustration of the unsatisfactoriness of a professional career," said Mr. Barnabee in a serious voice. "Mrs. Smith dropped out, there was a little ripple, and now she is forgotten. And that probably is the way it will be when the greatest come-

the way it will be when the greatest comedian on the American stage retires."

The last remark was rather in definite until the speaker threw back the lapels of his coat, thrust his hands into his pockets and rolled his eyes upward with a mock sincerity that was delicious in its finesse.

The Bostoniaus wanted Mr. Lumbard to sing "Sieeping Maggie," and that suggested another story. Many years ago Mr. Barnabee went out on a tour of thirty-nine nights, and at thirty-seven performances the company lost money. One of the party consoled the others by singing "Sieeping Maggie" every night. Their first engagement after returning home was to sing at a funeral. They turning home was to sing at a funeral. They had appeared to such small audiences that Mr. Barnabee unconsciously turned to the

soprano as they were gathered about the collin and asked: "Do you think we will make expenses?"

The drollery of the narrator was irresistable, and thus these two old friends talked on for an hour in a delightful spirit of com-radery, the player embellishing his points

with exquisite comedy.

Mr. Barnabee is quite as diverting in private life as on the stage, and has a charm of manner that is very grateful. In speaking of his professional career he said laughingly that he had been singing for 175 years. From the subsequent conversation it appears that he had sung in a Boston church choir for twenty-four years and this is the fourteenth season of the Bostonians. He had had some experience on the stage, having first appeared in "All is not Gold that Glitters," given as benefit for R. F. McLean, now leading man with Miss Maggie Mitchell. Afterwards be supported Boston's idol, William Warren, in Box and Cox."

The organization of the Boston Ideals, he said, was the unpremeditated re-sult of circumstances. "Pinafore" was the rage fifteen years ago, but had not received creditable production in Boston. A news-paper writer suggested that it ought to be given with an ideal cast and named the singers who afterwards were known as the Ideals. The suggestion was acted acted on and the company scored a great hit. They then took up "Fatinitza" and won another triumph. Miss Ober, who was wanaging a lecture bureau, saw an op-portunity to utilize this group of local musicians, and secured them for short circuits through New England, the members returning to Boston every Saturday for their church boir work and from that begin the permanent organization. Mr. Barnabee is in love with his work, enjoys excellent health, and will probably continue to enter-
