Wheat Almost Touched the Eighty Cent Mark Yesterday.

PECULIAR INFLUENCE WORKED THE DEAL

Later in the Day That Cereal Regained Some of Its Lost Strength and Closed at a Slight Advance Over Fre-

CHICAGO, 111., March 21.-Eighty cent wheat was the goal for the bears today. They did not get there, nevertheless the season's score for a low price was again broken. May option was pulled down to 89 to and closed under stc. On the other hand corn showed remarkable strength, chiefly on the expectation of lighter movement. Spring-like weather and weak cables took the heart out of the wheat market today. The recovery on the close was on ex-port buying reported from Minneapolis and sewhere.
