THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Prices in the Wheat Pit Took an Upward Turn.

SHORTS BECAME VERY MUCH EXCITED

Pardridge Tried Hard to Keep the Figures Below Those of Thursday But Without Success-Reports of Germany's Trouble Did It.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 3x-Ballooning was the word today in the wheat pit. Tonight the price was sparing majortically at 1% over the figures of last night. Pardridge tried hard to keep the price from getting above fully 1,003.033 bu., but the market jumped sky-ward while his brokers had still both hands up offering the stuff. The strength was largely due to the late Liverpool cables, big baying by Calaby and reports that Germany was getting more involved. Shorts became excited and there was a sudden bull feeling at the last few moments, the closing being buoyant at 834c. A good deal of attention was drawn to the fact that Boyden & Co. paid May prices to lay for 75,90) bu. of straight No. Chleagospring for export and for another lot of No. 2 Chicago spring in a special ele-vator a premium of 142 was bid by another buyer and refused by the owners.

There was a good deal of interest in wheat at the opening and prices were higher; the early cables quoted Liverpool 14c higher and all domestic markets opened strong with an advancing tendency. The big decline which has taken place during the last few days caused a rood deal of covering by shorts who had a good profit and were disposed to secure it. There was also some good buying for a scalp on the long side on the reaction. The opening sales for May snowed an advance of 14c from last night's close and for some time the feeling was strong and the maket quickly went to 81%c; New York was a good buyer. Chicago, Ili., March 25.—Counselman & Day to Cockrell Bros.: Wheat opened from ½c to ½c higher and advanced ½c further on general buying by Commission houses. After early orders were filled Pardridge sold 500,000 bushels of May wheat at 81½c in one block, and followed it up with a savage raid, breaking the price to 80½c. When the second English cables arrived bring tigh bigher quotations and moderate buying orders the market recovered to 81c, became active on numerous reports of crop damaze by the weather and insects in Kansis and Missouri, and the appearance of a general awakening of public interest in wheat. The market became broad and strong and advanced gradually to 82%c. closing at 82½c against 80%c yesterday. Corn has suddenly developed into a strong position. Very heavy purchases made this week though brokers, supposed to be covering shorts for Pardridge, now appear to be for the long account of a prominent provision dealer and the line was considerably increased today. The market closed strong at the high point. Oats were dull, but advanced ½c in sympathy with other markets. Shippers sold and the outside public were buyers. Provisious ruled tame, being sightly lower early on a 10c decline in hogs, but recovered and closed 2½c higher all around on account of light offerings and a moderate demand to cover short orders.

STOCKS AND BONDS. Material Losses Were Sustained by Many of

the Leading Securities, New York, March 23.-The stock market oday was under the hammer during most of the time and material losses were sustained in many of the leading stocks, though the firm undertone of the speculation precluded the selling of much long stock. The coalers and grangers were well supported and in some cases, as in New England and Union Pacific, positive strength was seen, though to ma-terial advance could be made after the first few minutes trading. The news of the action on the free colunge bill in congress caused a rush to buy at the opening, in which foreign houses, both English and German, were conspicuous. Materially higher quotations resulted, and in a few instances further improvement was made. In the early

quotations resulted, and in a few instances further improvement was made. In the early trading to counteract this influence, however, a rumor which was put out last night after the close of business that Mr. Olcott, chairman of the Richmond & West Point reorganization committee, had resigned from the committee, caused a bad break in the securities of that company and the common lost 2 per cent and the preferred dropped 5½ per cent. This drop put a wet blanket on buying for the long account in the whole list and the decline becoming so marked finally dragged the rest of the market down, only the strongest stocks succeeding in holding any portion of their opening advance.

All support was withdrawn from Lake Shore and that stock became the leader in the downward movement, even when the Richmond & West Point shares reacted quite sharply. A counter movement in the linustrials falled to help the list much, though Readinz displayed for a time marked activity and strength. The bears again circulated rumors reflecting on the credit of the Northern Pacific company and material help was derived from them in their attack upon the preferred stock, which was made one of the leading weak stocks of the afternoon. The losses of the two leading stocks, Lake Shore and Northern Pacific preferred, were about 3 per cent from the best prices of the forenoon but the general list was still traded in within the narrowest limits and the undertone of strength which prevailed throughout the day prevented any marked decline, though prices were brought in almost all cases below the list of opening figures. The low prices furnished no marked movement, except as sharp reaction of about 3 per cent in Ohio Southern. The pressure to seil was lifted from time to time during the day and at such time prices railied feebly, but in the last hour there was an effort to cover the shorts put out early in the day and more substantial improvement was a made. Northern Pacific preferred especially moving up about 1 per cent.




