"I intend to establish a second beet sugar plant near San Francisco." said Mr. Spreck-ics, "and have a good deal of the machinery there now. My first plant has a capacity of 6,000 tons of beets a day and cost me \$500,000. I give premiums for the best beets in order to encourage the farmers to raise as good a crop as possible. For the best beets I pay as high as \$7 a ton."

With reference to the difficulty of getting with reference to the dimensity of getting farmers interested in sugar beet cul-ture Mr. Spreckles said: "Yes, I have had considerable difficulty in getting farmers to engage in beet culture, but I think that with the introduction of but 1 think that with the introduction of improved machinery farmers will be inclined to look with more favor apon beet farming. I have a machine for plowing out the beets and I shall have another machine by next fall that will cut off the tops and tails rapidly and I think satisfactorily. If farmers would fully consider the great benefit that beet raising is to the soil they would see that beet farming is destined to become the salvation of the agricultural districts of this great west. By a system of rotation the soil will produce more grain in ten years by planting it three years during that time to beets than to plant it the whole ten years to grain. The farmer is just three beet crops abcad and has better grain by suct a process." "Is the present bounty on beet sugar paid by the government suisfactory to you?" "Yes, I am very well satisfied with the arrangement. One thing is certain, we must have either a bounty or a tariff. I think it would be a wise policy to give the sugar lows:

have either a bounty or a tariff. I think it would be a wise policy to give the sugar beet farmer some encouragement, also, by way of a bounty until the busi-ness of beet farming is thoroughly established in this country." Mr. Spreckles thought that beet culture in Nebraska should be a success because he be-lieved that labor could be had here at a lower rate than in California. He was surprised to find the percentage of sugar or saccharine matter in Nebraska grown beets so high.


