Motes Prepare a Dramatization of General Watlace's Incomparable Story. A pantomimic production of General Lew Wallace's "Ben Hur" was given at rehearsal last night at the Deaf and Dumb institute. preparatory for the initial presentation of

the entertainment at Boyd's new theater next Wednesday night. For the past three mouths the students of the institute have been studying "Ben Hur" under the direction of Superintendent John A. Gillesple, and now present the pantomimic scenes of the famous story in a novel and entertaining manner.

At last night's rehearsal the participants had a great time in their silence and fun. When they appear at Boyd's before a criti-cal public they will not be alluded to as barn-stormers, because they make little noise, especially with their elecution.

By gestures their passion is expressed and the enforcement of sentiment and argument is made, and to one in whose memory the story of "Ben Hur" is deeply impressed the plot can readily and easily be followed by the sellows of the mutes.

There are twenty-three partomimic scenes that depict the story, and it is told by gesti-culation by twenty-two performers and fif-teen supers. The costumes are supposed to be historic, and are indeed a very good con-ception of the wardrobe possessed by "Bee Hur" when he is in Rome.

The first scene shows the meeting of the wise men (Balthasar, Gaspar and Melchior, characterized respectively by Fred Beck, Asa Beahm and Christine Hanson), in the desert, Beck's Balthasar was good when he showed how weary he was from his long journey, and his disappointment of expected companions. He ordered refreshments for three, as he had implicit faith that his companions would come, for he knew that God only was great. Then Meichler enters and is followed by Garage. praver. Ic the next scene the birth of Christ is an nounced, and shepherds with a sentinel are seen. A light from heaven alarms the sentinel, but an angel bids all not to fear. The shepherds leave to see the new born child. The wise men follow the star and the people awaken and discuss the strange

phenomenon.

Ben Hur who is played by Charles E. Comp, a young man of fine physique, is first seen with Messaia (C. C. Wentz), in the fourth scene. Comp is a good pantomimist and gets into a gesticulating discussion with Messala over the new procurator. In their review of the past years Messala belittles the Jew and speaks of Roman possibilities

Then their friendship ceases forever and they become deadly enemies. Ben Hur then meets his mother (Otio B. Crawford) who endeavors to ascertain the cause of her son's trouble. He tells her about Messala and she refers to Jewish history and points out a comparison between Rome and Judea. The mother gives Bon Hur permission to become a soldier, but during a procession the soldiers rush into the palace and Ben Hur, his mother and sister, Tirzah (Eva O. Comp), are taken prisoner, being pointed out to them by Mes-sala. The prisoners implore Messala for

(Charles Sproktis), who afterwards adopts
