Firemen Confused by Alarms at an Early Morning Blazs.

DESTRUCTION OF AN OLD LANDMARK

News from the Churches-Arrested for Obtaining Money Under False Pretenses -Program of the Bicyclists for the Month of May.

The firemen were considerable confused at about 2 o'clock yesterday morning by an alarm of fire which came almost simultancous'y from box 23, near the corner of Broad way and First street, and 35, at the Burlington depot on South Main street. The fire which caused the alarm was at son died yesterday morning at 5 o'clock. It was undoubtedly caused by Woodbury. It was undoubtedly caused by an incendiary and the confusion caused by the conflicting alarms, neither of which was turned in from a place very near the fire, and the consequent delay in reaching the scene gave the flames such a start that about all the firemen could do was to prevent them from setting the neighboring houses on fire. The building was entirely destroyed. It had been empty for a long time and there was no insurance.

Had it not been for the ignorance of a night watchman at Hoagland's lumber yard on Main street a third alarm would have been sent in and it is doubtful if the firemen would have gotten the tangle unraveled before morning. When Chief Levin arrived at box 34 in No. 1 engine house on Main street after the fire had been extinguished he found the watchman standing with the box door open waiting patiently for the bell to ring. He evidently thought that if he opened the door the button would do the rest, and so he had the button would do the rest, and so he had neglected to press the button. The destroyed building was one of the old innumarks, it stood on Pearl street near the forner of First avenue until about a year ago, when it was removed to make room for the Woodbury block. It was occupied fifteen or twenty years ago as an office by the law firm of Baldwin, Wright & Rising.

IN ENGLAND.

Peace and Good Order Prevailed-Monster

Demonstrations. LONDON, May 1.- The expected and long prepared for labor demonstrations were held today in most of the large cities on the continent, and in various manufacturing and mining districts. In many places the authorities had forbidden the holding of processions and the workingmen observed the holiday by taking their families to suburban resorts and passing the day in a quiet manner.

In view of the many outrages perpetrated by anarchists during the past few months, and the many threats that have been made to make the day memorable for its disorders, the authorities in all continental cities adopted the most stringent precautions to

prevent or suppress any outbreak. pointed time at which they were to show themselves in force and to give proof of their power. Thus far advices received here show that in most places the day passed harmlessly, if not quietly. There were assemblies of workmen where speeches of a somewhat inflammatory character were made, but the police were generally on the alert, and good order, if it was not absolutely preserved, was very easily restored where breaches of the peace did occur.

Found in a Black Bag. A black bag was found today in a secluded street peside the Wootwich arsenal containing gun cotion, dynamite, and gunpowder, in it was also found a belt filled with cartridges and several documents written in a foreign language, recognized to be the work of a person whom the police are now tracking. The police refuse to divulge the name of this individual. No fuse was attached to the explosives and it does not appear that any attempt was made to cause un explosion. The bag was taken to an isolated magazine

located on the Woolwich marshes. The day was observed here quietly. large procession marched to Hyde park, where monster meetings were held. A large number of speakers addressed the crowd including Cunningham E. Graham, the socialist member of the House of Commons, Tom Mann and Ben Tillot, the labor leaders, and Stepniak, the Russian ninilist. Resolutions were adopted favoring an eight-hour day and calling upon Parliament to pass an eight hour bill. There was no disturbance. Perfect Order Prevailed.

The meeting was the largest demonstration of workingmen ever organized in this city. They began to assemble on the banks of the Thames at 10 o'clock in the morning. Each contingent was hended by a band of music, and every band of paraders carried banners, while the men were bedecked with rosettes and flowers. Altogether, the procession made a bright spectacle, and applause was frequent as the laborers marched along in perfect order.

An idea may be given of the magnitude of the demonstration when it is stated that the procession occupied nearly three hours entering Hyde park. The number of per sons taking part is variously estimated at from 300,000 to 500,000. The speeches made and the proceedings generally were in accordance with the program. A large force of police and ambulances were present. The

assemblage dispersed quietly.

> Chleago Police Tear Them from the Hands of Paraders-A Quiet Day. Chicago, Ill., May 1.-A highly sonsational incident occurred in the May day celebration here today. It was none other than the sezure of three sanguinary emblems which were carried by three paraders in the immense procession, which was the feature

of today's celebration. The police had issued strict orders for the regulation of the demonstration, among which was one that no red flags or other aparchistic draperies would be permitted in the parade, and they evidently meant what they said. At the head of two dozen men from the Arbeiter Zeitung office a flaming red flag was carried. It had been prepared for the occasion, as a strip of bunting covered with stars

 carried flags which were so red that they drew the disapproval of Superintendent Hubbard. After watching the procession for some time the divisions carrying anarchistic emblems caught the eye of Superintendent Huobard, who immediately resolved to cap-ture them at all hazards. 
