Workingmen Discover the Body of an Infant in a Sewer.

At about 3:30 o'clock yesterdey afternron workmen engaged in cleaning the sewer belonging to the Union Stock Yards company found the body of a fully developed and newy born girl baby. The body was found in the large man-hole about two blocks northeast of the Exchange building.

Undertaker Brewer was notified by Coro-ner Maul to take charge of the body, which he did. When he arrived there the body was at the bottom of the sewer, and he was not long in bringing it to the surface. Wrapped around the body was a white cloth of cheap material, and adhering to this was a mece of a newspaper bearing the date of April 28. Nearly the whole left side of the face was crushed in, and the left eye was completely knocked out. An abraisen on the

right side of the chin was also plainly visi-ble. The infant was fully developed, its weight was estimated at nine pounds, and the child had a head of heavy black hair. The appearance of the dead child plainly indicates that it had not been thrown into the sewer longer than two or three days ago. The distance from the top of the manhole to the bottom of the sewer is nearly twenty feet, and if the child was thrown in alive the fall would have been sufficient to cause death. While the play treats of the intrigues of Catherine it does not fail to give to the gentleman playing Peter excellent oppor-tunity for a display of histrionic talents. In this sense it is not a one-part play, but de-pends upon a half dozen people for its dovel-opment. Dealing, as it does, with one of the great characters of history, a Romanoff, whose iron will and impetuosity has been the watchword for his successors since the days of Catherine it appeals strongly to the student of history and the lover of the legitimate in stage characterization. Catherine's amours are somewhat softened by the treatment of the play, but still Scribe has, with no uncertain tone, held the mirror up to na-ture in this story of Russia under the Romanoffs as he has in all his works done for the Comedie Francaise, The tarjuin has had his apologists as the cenci her detractors, and after resting under centuries of evil fame it has been asserted that the Borgins were heroes and virtuous sufferers, not sin ners. As these criminals exert a fascination upon certain minds it can be readily understood how Catherine, in her womanhood, would appeal to the auditor easily swayed by the rich tones of a voice and the beau; y of a voluptuous figure. Mile. Rhea brings to the role of Catherine

a finished art which is thoroughly captivating. Her rich voice is heard to advantage in the strong and tenseful situations with Peter and in her scenes with Count Sapieha, her lover, there is a tenderness that is irresisti-ble. The slight French accent which Rhea gives in her English reading is particularly apropos in this characterization and whether in her own character or in the dramatic role of Catherine, who assumes a scepter to recompease her lover through pique and entousy, she is always Rhea with a personal charm of manner that often makes one forget






