Engineer Ford Observed the Fatal Culvert as the Train Approached at a High Rate of Speed-Capital City News Notes.

Lincoln, Neb., May 2 .- [Special to Tun Ber. j-The police muddle took another aspect this afternoon. Shortly after 3 o'clock Judge Tibbetts gave an oral opinion on the pase in which F. B. In sustaining the demurrer filed by the defendants Judge Tibbetts stated that he held that Dinges and his men were entitled to be placed back in the position they occupied before the suit was commenced; but he was not prepared to suggest any means by which Otto and his men could be ejected. Attorney Adams, who appeared for Mayor Weir and the defense, stated at the close of the judge's remarks that he would suggest a remedy in the form of a motion to be filed tomorrow morning.

Victims of Yesterday's Wreck, The remains of H. P. Shriner, the Burlington fireman killed in the wreck near Crete yes terday morning, have lain at Roberts & Pal-mer's undertaking rooms in this city today and have been viewed by many people who had known him in life. His head was un-injured, but his arms, legs and body were terribly mangied. Shriner was 25 years old terribly mangled. Shriner was 25 years old and well esteemed among his associates. He was a member in good standing of the Ancient Order of United Workmen and has a brother at Nebraska City. His mother and two sisters live at Cleveland, O., while another sister resides in Colorado. His funeral will take place at the undertaking rooms at 7:30 tomorrow morning and the remains taken to Plattsmouth for interment. One of the tramps killed in the wreck has One of the tramps killed in the wreck has been identified by parties in this city as Freu Baker. His family lives at Morris, Ill., and have been notified.

Engineer Ford's Story, George R. Ford, the engineer of the wrecked train, lives in the Weber block at the corner of Fourteenth and P streets in

this city. His right hand is badly injured and his face and head considerably bruised and cut. He stated today that as his engine approached the fatal culvert they were runapproached the fatal culvert they were run-ning down grade at a speed of from thirty to thirty-five miles an hour. Fireman Shriner was sitting on the seat on his side of the cab, and, as they approached the culvert, re-marked, "That's a big nody of water down there. It looks dangerous," With that he crossed to the gangway on the right side of the engine, and was looking ahead when the fatal crash came. Ford says he don't remem-ber how he got out of the cab himself, but thinks he jumped or was thrown from the cab window, as he was sitting down looking out of the window when the engine went

Wilson made up the statement of real estate mortgage filings and releasings for the preceding month. During April there were thirty farm mort-gages filed, aggregating \$23,823, and fifty-seven satisfied, amounting to \$57,427, an excess of twenty-seven releases, of \$23,604. Of these flings \$12,000 were in part payment of purchase money, so the filings appear larger than they really are. Of city mortgages there were filed fourteen, \$0.873, and released twenty-nine, \$17,226. For the last pine months this has been about the average. The following is a synopsis of the con-The Nebraska Central agrees to build a double track, steel raidway bridge across the river at the point before mentioned and also a double track railroad from the west approach of the bridge through the city to a connection with the tracks of the Union Stock Yards and Railway company at South Omaha, and also to project a line of railway from the west approach of the bridge in a westernly direction from a point on the main line, north of Pacific street to a point on the Little Pappio in section 25, township 15, range and also to construct a line of railway from a junction with the main line near the intersection of Fourteenth and Izard streets, portherly to Grace street. For doing this Douglas county will donate to the Nebraska Central \$500,000 of Its 41/2 per cent bonds dated July 1, 1892, due and payable twenty years from date and drawing interest, payable semi-annually, from January 1, 1894.
The bonds, if voted, are to be executed and registered on July 1, 1892, and delivered to the First National bank of Omaha, to be held in trust for delivery to the Nebraska Central, its successors or assigns, in installments as follows: One-half when the bridge and its approaches are completed and the remain-ing one-half on the completion of the railway lines, all matured coupons to be removed before delivery by the trustee, who shall deliver the bonds after the county commis sioners, by resolution, shall declare that the bonds have been earned by the railway com-

pany. Will Begin Work Within a Year,

push it to such an extent that the sum of \$500,000 shall be expended in the actual con-struction of the bridge and railway within nine months from the date of the commence-ment of work. This expenditure is not to include the cost of the right-of-way. Work shall not cease for a period of exceeding ninety days before the sum of not less than \$2,000,000 has been expended. All of the work on both the bridge and railway shall be empleted within three years from July 1,

In case these conditions are not complied with (unless delay is directly caused by in-junctions or other judicial proceedings, or by unavoidable accident or act of Providence) the company small not receive the honds, but all right to them shall be forfeited. In consideration of receiving the subsidies the Nebraska Central agrees to allow all rail-way companies the right to run their locomotives, passenger and freight cars over the bridge, its approaches and over the tracks and main lines; and it also agrees to allow each and every railroad desiring to enter the city of Omaha, over its tracks, the right to use such portions of its terminal grounds, depots and facilities as may be necessary and proper for the conducting of the business of such roads. It also agrees to switch and deliver upon all of its switch tracks the cars

of all railway companies, and also that all railway companies shall have the right to connect their lines at any point within 100 miles of the city of Omaha with any line or road which the Nebraska Central, its successors or assigns may con struct, or cause to be constructed east of the Missouri river, and to run their locomotives, passenger and freight trains over the main and passing tracks into the city of Omaha. These roads will also be allowed to connect with any of the Nebraska Central lines con structed, or to be constructed in Douglas county and within 100 miles, either cost or west, of the Missouri river, and to cross the same for the purpose of entrance to and egress from the city of Omaha, provided that the use and enjoyment of such rights by other railways shall be upon just and equal terms and the payment of just and fair compensa

In cases of dispute between the Nebraska Central and any other railway company with respect to the use, terms, operating rules of regulations, such disputes shall be submitted to and determined by arbitrators, who shall be three of the judges of the district court, embracing the county of Douglas. The plan of arbitration is like this: The

aggrieved party shall serve notice upon the opposite party, setting out the matter in dispute. The time of hearing shall not be less than thirty days from that date. After serdays in which to answer. The decision of a majority of the board shall control and the determination shall be final and conclusive upon the parties, in all matters submitted.
In regard to freight rates the Nebraska Central agrees to transport all freight over its bridge and approaches, as well as over the 100 miles of railway which it constructs in

Nebraska at just and reasonable rates.

In case of difference as to what constitutes just and reasonable rates, the board of county commissioners or the railway company may submit the same to arbitration. The paragraph respecting freight rates however, does not become operative until five years from the date of the delivery of the last installment of county bonds.

The Nebraska Central also agrees that the bonds shall not be delivered unless it enters into an undertaking that its principal depot, its general offices and principal machine shops shall be located and maintained within the corporate limits of the city of Omaha. Any violation of the terms of the undertaking will render the bonds void and lay the road, its successors and assirus, indebted to the county of Douglas in the full amount of the bonds and the interest thereon.

The proposition of the Nebraska Central is to be recorded in the office of the register of deeds of Douglas county, and for a period of twenty years it shall be referred to by page and book in all deeds of trust or mortgages, with the statement that the Nebraska Central, its successors and assigns, are bound by the terms of the proposition.

If the bonds are voted the railroad company shall within forty-five days file with the county clerk its written ratification and acceptance under its corporate seal, or else none of the bonds will be issued. Upon the voting of the bonds hereinbefore mentioned the Nebraska Central surrenders


