STOCKMEN ALARMED.

They Object to Texas Cattle Being Un-loaded in South Dakota,

RAPID CITY, S. D., May 29 .- | Special Telegram to THE BEE. |-Dr. M. J. Treacy, vetermary surgeon at Fort Meade, engaged by the Pennington county board of health to report on Texas cattle being unloaded at Brennan finished his examination today. Out of 12,-000 unloaded 500 died immediately of exhaustion, starvation and injuries re-ceived enroute.
