Thinks There Are Too Many Churc'ist. Rector E. J. Babcock of St. Paul's Episcopat church commenced a series of sermons yesterday morning on the general subject of 'The Sufficiency of the Church." What called his mind to that subject was a sermon he heard during his recent visit to the diocesan convention at Davenport, in which the speaker intimated strongly that the the speaker intimited strongly that the church had proved itself incompetent to maintain the standard which outsiders have a right to expect of it, and to constitute itself a central spring out of which shall flow the religious life of the community in which it is located. Mr. Babcock is a firm believer in the sufficiency of the church and he has consequently beginn a same of and he has consequently begun a series of sermons in which he intends to prove that if which is set for it by the bible and avoid the petty differences and discords which have made it a laughing stock in so many places, there will be no reason for fear that it will be unable to fulfil the expectations of its founds.

"I am convinced that the time will come when the little differences of creed will vanish and the churches which were formerly one will again become united," said Mr. Babcock in a private conversation on the Babcock in a private conversation on the subject after the sermon was ended, "and I believe that a very potent factor in bringing about a revolution of this kind will be a rebeliion on the part of business men who are now beset on all sides with appeals to nelp this, that and the other religious cause. In a town of 3,500 inhabitants where I formerly lived in Michigan there were fourteen churches, many of them so weak as to have to call upon the outside public for aid to have to call upon the outside public for aid almost constantly. It is much the same way in any town. In keeping up these struggling organizations there is a tremendous amount of waste, and people are beginning to see

that it is a very expensive thing to have so many churches, especially where so compara-tively little real religious work is done by them. 
