Reports of rain from the west and southwest and indications of dasspness in the northwest and indications of dasspness in the northwest caused the early advance. It was claimed that wheat, if the weather turns hot, is liable to rot. There was also talk about the government crop report which, it was thought, would make a bad showing.
