THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Rain in the Winter Wheat Sections Advanced That Cereal.

OATS SHARED IN THE IMPROVEMENT

Some Early Weakness in Wheat Was Due to Reported Clear Weather West of the Mississippi River, But the Decline Developed a Demand.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 2.-A harvest of dough Instead of grain was predicted by some gloomy speculators today. More rain in the corn and winter wheat sections caused an advance in those articles. Oats shared in the improvement and provisions, after early weakness, recovered later. Wheat was about Mc dearer and provisions, after early weak-ness, recovered most of the decline. The corn market settled back to second place today with wheat again the leader of the market for interest and activity. Initial transactions were at the advance. Rains were reported in lown, Illinois. Missouri and Indi-ana and had a strengthening influence. Offer-ings soon afterward became more liberal on indications of better weather west and the price worked down from 4e to 5e better, but railed later in the session 5e on bad advices from the interior.

Not much oats were offered, and this fact,
with the strength in corn and unfavorable
weather, caused improvement in prices. The

The provision market opened weak at some decime from the cosing prices of the day before and ruled easier during the greater part of the session, but closed firm in sympathy with corn. The opening decline was due to the reported receipts of 41,030 hogs at the yards. Some pork which had been bought earlier in the week came upon the market in the toremon. Lard was the only article on the provision list which did benefit by the latter advance. Increase in the local stocks during the month was the probable cause.

Trading Was More Barren of Results Than for Many Weeks Past. New York, June 2.—The stock market was more barren of feature than for many weeks past, the apathy seemingly having extended to the bear side of the market as well as to the buil, though the early arrival of the hot term may have induced many members of the board to stay away and thus reduce the volume of business and the width of the fluctuations. No one at present seems able to see where the narrowness and professional character of the market will end and general opinion is that only when the character of the growing crops is assured will operators be disposed to take hold again. Just at present the coal stocks interested in the combine and the granzers attract most speculative atten-tion, principally because both groups are supposed by the cears to offer the most vulnerable freedom from a speculative méasure. The fluctuations in these stocks today was not of such a nature as to make a reliable situation. Frie and Burilarton were still leaders in point of activity but the operations

on the short side were seriously curtailed and the man festations were another order entirely, while the absonce of bear pressure was seen in duminess and a general tendency when was no more than held in check by the local traders. Toward celivery, however, the stubborn resistance which the market had made to all the efforts to get prices down and the fear that the larger bears had deserted them, led call shorts to cover and the demand became so urgent that considerable activity was developed which caused improvement in some stocks and the market finally closed fairly active and strong at the best figures of the day.
