

DUN'S REVIEW OF THE WEEK

Promises of Immense Crops Act as a Stimulant to Trade.

MANUFACTORIES ACTIVELY AT WORK

Unprecedented Increase in the Boot and Shoe Trade—Reports from Business Centers—Wall Street for a Week—Clearing House Statements.

New York, June 24.—R. G. Dun's weekly review of trade says: Another week has passed with great improvement in the growing crops. In wheat, so great a chance of condition appears that men begin to question whether the yield this year will not closely approximate the unprecedented crop of 1891. For other grain and cotton the outlook is decidedly better and there is reason now to hope for highly satisfactory results from the year's agricultural harvest. In consequence there is stronger trade throughout the country and especially at western centers of distribution. The improvement is less marked at the south, owing to the very low price of cotton and continued high water in some regions. The one point of anxiety in regard to the wage dispute in the iron manufacture operates for the present to cause increased trade, while in other great industries the situation is clearly more favorable than usual.

In the Metal Market. The iron manufacturers desire a revision of the wage scale on the ground that the improved machinery has enabled labor to produce 66 per cent more than in former years, and has reduced prices so far that the 6-cent basis is no longer just. There is little ground for hope that a prolonged strike may be averted, and meantime the demand for all forms of manufactured iron and steel distinctly improves. There is a better demand for plates and for structural iron, prices being firmer, and some gain in bar iron and even in steel rails. Pig iron is still weak and feverish, southern supplies being large, but northern makers wait to see whether a strike is coming before reducing prices. Copper is an eighth lower and large sales are reported at 24 cents and lead is lower at 84.05 in some transactions. Coal is dull and outsiders are selling below the combination price.

The boot and shoe manufacture is entering upon a season expected to be one of unprecedented activity, the year's business is already within 2 per cent of the greatest ever known, and gaining every week. There is a fairly large business in low grade wools, and sales of wool are better than usual for the season. Print cloths are strong at 35 cents and some advance in prints is anticipated.

Reports from the Cities. At Boston the demand from recently flooded western districts has fully revived and business is strong. Lower prices for bleached shirtings have caused large sales and prices have been raised again. The woolen mills are steadily employed and there are large orders for fall goods in the boot and shoe trade, so that the factories are busy with every prospect for the largest trade ever known.

At Philadelphia the grocery trade has a remarkably good season, and there is some improvement in dry goods, with larger demand from the south. Wool buying is close, with prices the lowest for the year.

At Pittsburgh there are brighter prospects of a wage settlement, but finished iron is cool.

At Cleveland better trade is seen in groceries, hardware and shoes, and other business is fair for the season. The foundries are especially busy at Cincinnati, but machinery is a little slow.

Trade with Chicago is larger than a year ago, with receipts double last year's in flour, corn, rye, oats, dressed beef and lard, and even greater in wool, with a slight loss in wool, cheese and butter.

Business in the West. At Milwaukee business is quiet, but though crops are backward the prospect is considered very bright.

At Minneapolis a marked increase is seen in trade, with a large business in lumber and good quotations.

At St. Paul trade is good and prospects bright. Missummer dullness appears at St. Louis, although railroads are having temporary blockades and business is as strong as could be expected.

At Omaha trade is good in all lines, and at Kansas City in wholesale branches, receipts a little slow.

At Louisville trade is satisfactory and improving, and at Little Rock prospects are brighter, but business at Memphis is inactive and at New Orleans dull on account of high water.

Speculation has not been especially active and wheat is unchanged in price, though western receipts are 2,000,000 bushels in thirty days and exports are only 73,000 bushels.

Corn receipts at the west are 2,400,000 bushels in thirty days with small exports, but the price has advanced 2 cents and oats 6 cents.

Pork products are unchanged but oil is 1 1/2 cents and coffee 3/4 of a cent lower.

Gold exports were independent of merchandise balances, for the enormous produce exports in May are followed by increased gold exports and in exports from New York in June this fact indicating an aggregate for the fiscal year not far from \$1,000,000. In every part of the country money is in ready supply and the demand at nearly all points is only moderate, collections being generally quite satisfactory for the season.

The business failures occurring throughout the country during the last seven days are 190 as compared with totals of 179 last week. For the corresponding week of last year the figures were 234.

WALL STREET FOR A WEEK.

American and European Politics Influenced the Market to a Marked Degree.

New York, June 24.—Bradstreet's weekly review says: The Chicago convention and gold shipments divided the attention of Wall Street during the week. As regards the former, speculative sentiment seemed to regard the renomination by the great political parties of their respective champions of four years ago with satisfaction. Early in the week there was a rather bullish tendency to prices. Thursday's market was as dull as those which precede it, and the traders who had been waiting to buy found in the shipment to Europe of an unexpectedly large amount of gold (making \$5,250,000 for the week) a fair excuse for selling on the market. The continued ease with which European powers obtain supplies of gold from the country attracts increased attention, and its connection with the decrease in the treasury's specie holdings and the augmentation of the amount of silver notes is a matter which is earnestly discussed in financial circles. MET THE REDUCED RATE. The Santa Fe Sees the Rock Island's Tariff on Southwestern Cattle. Freight Agent Districts of the Santa Fe returned yesterday morning from headquarters at Topeka and brought the news that his line had met the reduced Rock Island rate on cattle from the southwest. The Santa Fe has issued a circular announcing that the rate from Oklahoma and Indian Territory points to Omaha and South Omaha will hereafter be but \$12.50 higher than the rate to Kansas City on shipments made by way of Concordia, Kan. This means that the Burlington has joined with the Santa Fe in making the reduced rate. The old tariff still holds good on shipments by way of Kansas City and Superior, but it is thought that the Missouri Pacific and the Elkhorn will soon come to terms.
