"My Dear Gentlemen: I accuse myself guilty of the slaying of John R. Carter, but not in cold blood. I was determined not to let him get the best of me, so I was prepared for him. When I called him out of the quarters to dispute our misunderstanding, he didn't give me a chance."

"God have mercy on him! I be had not bit me we might both have been at peace and liberty at this very moment, but that I leaved to the judgment of my omnipresent God, and the sword of the Lord cut him off."
