

THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Hot Weather Had a Depressing Effect on Board Traders.

PRICES UNDERWENT LITTLE CHANGE

Wheat Was Excessively Tame and Featureless—Fluctuations Were Narrow But the Changes, Though Modest, Were Frequent—Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 22.—The hot weather had a depressing effect on the crowd on the board today and they consequently did very little business. Prices underwent very little change, but what alteration there was in grain was against prices, wheat closing from 1/2c to 3/4c lower and corn at a decline of 1/4c.

The wheat market was excessively tame and featureless. Fluctuations were narrow and featureless. The market was moderately active, but the changes were weak at a loss of from 1/2c to 3/4c, September starting at from 78c to 79c, but during the succeeding two hours the tendency was toward September, and advanced from 78c to 79c.

September advanced from 78c to 79c. At this point rumors of heavy offerings of wheat began to be circulated upon the floor and a reactionary movement set in, which continued until the close, when the market closed at 78c to 79c.

Corn was rather firm early in the session, influenced by the heavy shipments of corn from the West, but later reports of hot winds in Kansas started shorts to buying, and the market advanced from 78c to 79c.
