of the Plague. London, July 25 .- The Times' St. Peters. burg correspondent says: Official enolora returns for the period from July 17 to July

21 give the number of cases in Russia as 4,480 and the number of deaths as 2,590 There were thirty-five cases in Nijni-Novgorod on Saturday. The Moscow Gazette rebut no official reports make mention of them. The doctors of St. Petersburg are daily expecting cholera to appear here. The prefect of police is dealing severely with opposition to sanitary measures. Two servants in charge of a house have been sentenced to two weeks' imprisonment respectively and to

a year's banishment from St. Petersburg for

keeping the house in a filthy condition. The Standard's correspondent at St. Petersburg says: The riots in Astrakhan and other places were partly due to the attitude of the doctors, who, it was reported, often refused to touch or examine the sick except from a distance, which treatment the lower classes resented. Nobody takes the official cholers returns as representing the actual state of affairs. The population does its utmost to conceal cases. All the same it appears that the epidemic is rather mild and gives no ground for general anxiety. It will be felt more as a hindrance to commercial activity than as a danger to the popula-

Guarding Against Cholera in Vienna, VIENNA, July 25 .- Prof. Drache, an expert n choicra, says that the cases of choicrine in Vienna at present are fewer than usual at this time of the year. There is little prob-ability, he thinks, of a general invasion of Europe by choiera, though there is danger of its reaching Austria, but should August and September pass without an outbreak that danger will be over.

The ministry of education has issued a circular to the public, giving instructions how to diagnose cholera and what immediate treatment to adopt. The government will accept the services of every available physician. The prisons are being thoroughly

inspected.

Decreasing in Paris. Paris, July 25,-The outbreak of cholera n the suburbs continues to diminish. Only we deaths were reported yesterday, Dr. Boyland, formerly a professor in a Baltimore medical college, who has bad considerable experience with cholera epidemics, declares hat there is no real Asiatic cholera in Paris. He says that the disease prevalent here is merely cholerine, arising from the use of water from the river Seine and that there is no reason to fear an epidemic, the majority of the cases having originated in crowded houses and among consumers of bad food. Other doctors concur in the opinion that the disease prevalent in the city is cholerine, but express the belief that there have been several cases of Asiatic cholera in the

suburbs. Reports from Other Points. Sr. Petersnung, July 25 .- In Nipit-Novrorod cholera is confined to a few travelers from infected districts. The epidemic on the Volga is decreasing rapidly in the south of Russia.
