#### THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Everything Opened Lower on the Beard of Trade Yesterday.

AMOUNT ON OCEAN PASSAGE INCREASED

Bear Factors Started the Market Lower, But There Was Very Little for Sale -Reports of Crop Damage in the Northwest.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 23. - While nearly everything opened lower on the Hoard of Trade to-day there was an absence of much that was builish in the way of news. The feeling soon turned strong and there was a general acvance along the whole line. In wheat nearly everything in the way of news favored lowe prices. Cables were lower and very dull, but the receipts were unexpectedly large at all other points and the statistical information. was anything but builtsh. The amount on ocean passage increased 512,030 bu., the English visible increased 1,356.030 bu., and the stock of wheat and flour in the United Kingdom was reported at 564.481 bu. The aggregate receipts at Chicago, St. Louis and Tolede were 1,141,0.0 bu., against 7,4,000 bu. for the same day last year, and all information tended to confirm previous roports of a heavy winter wheatcrop. These bear factors did start the market a trifle lower, but there was very little for sale and Lozan and Griflin proved good buyers and the scalping element did not feel disposed to sell much. Even the uncertainty in the railroad situation at Buffalo did not deter buyers, and heavy purchasing orders were received from New Yors and St. Louis. The general summing up was that wheat was strong, chiefly tecause of the strength in our nind oats. A rise is established in Midland of ½ per cent, and London & Northwestern and ½ to ½ per cent in most others. Brighton deferred, however, leaves off ½ per cent lower after having shown a small rise. Americans have been more or less firm all day owing to reasonable advices regarding the strikes.
