

To this Meeca all veterans that love of country which will protect who can afford the expense are preparing to journey. The citizens of Washington have taken a most creditable interest in the encampment. They have \$55,000 for providing lodgings for such veterans as cannot afford the luxury of Washington hotel lifeduring their stay, and will furnish quarters for not less than 50,000 men. These quarters include the schools and available public buildings and temporary barracks and tents. The committee will put up bunks, light the quarters with electric lights so there the quarters with electric lights so there may be no danger from fire, provide let us begin work with clearer views and means for washing and give the men every other accommodation that will add to their comfort.

Applications for quarters are coming

in at headquarters at the rate of almost 1,000 men a day, and at the present time more men, by many thousands, have been quartered than have attended any previous encampment. It would not require such an awful stretch of the imagination for the spectator lounging about in the rear of the white house to believe that Cramp had removed his shippards to that immediate vicinity. At all events, the construction of the good ship Kearsarge is going on, and the veterans who served on the United States war vessels are lending their labor and their energy to make the vessel a success. When complete, the Kearsarge will be visible from her water line up, and will appear on the green lawn as if lying at anchor. Col. Michael is now at Norfolk for the purpose of securing such material as may be nec-cessary. When the vessel is finished it will not be a rough model, but will be a perfect representation of the famous vessel which sent the Alabama to the bottom of the ocean off the coast of At the last muster of the Potomac As-

under discussion was the various projects for the entertainment of the visiting shipmates from other ports. Colonel Michael, chairman of the naval features of the Grand Army reunion, was called upon for a few remarks, to which he responded, and gave an outline of what it was proposed to do, and with the assistance of the shipmates of the Potomac association he said he had no fears but what the desired object would be accomplished. It is proposed to hold reunions on the ship, certain days being assigned to the North Atlantic, South Atlantic, Gulf and Mississippi squadrons and Poto mac flotilla. The first day will be assigned to the Kearsarge, on which day a prominent navai officer, one who was on the vessel auring the fight with the Alabama, will deliver an address suitable and appropriate to the occasion. In each of the other squadron reunions it is proposed to obtain some one to deliver an address relative to each station. Plans are being suggested to have a ball on the ship about the middle of the week which will be arranged in the Upon arriving in Keokul same manner as though the ship was affont. Thousands of those at the encampment have never seen a ball on board of ship and this feature of the program will be something new. The naval veterans are busy making their arrangements to visit Baltimore on the 17th of September next, and have invited all veteran sailors of the war to join them. The entire Naval Veteran association will come over from Baltimore on the morning of September 20

and take part in the Grand Army of the Republic parade. It is proposed to construct a magnificent arch across Pensylvania avenue in front of the Treasury department in honor of the veterans of the Grand As the line of veterans swing out of Fifteenth street into Pennsylvania avenue and before passing before the presidential reviewing stand they will pass under this arch. The structure will be pure white, and will rise to height of some ninety-five feet. It will span the avenue from curb to curb, a width at that point of some eighty-five feet. The span of the arch will be some fifty feet, and the height about the same. The style is of the classic order, the pilasters on each side being finished with Corinthian capitals. Upon the square top and at each end will be placed figures twelve high, one representing a soldier of 1865 and the other a Grand Army of the Republic veteran of 1892. These dates are below. On the other side will be a figure representing a sailor and his civilian counterpart of today. In the middle portion will be a coat of arms of the United States surrounded by flags, The figure as well as the coat of arms will be in white, in harmony with the rest of the structure, which will be built of wood and galvanized iron and painted to represent white marble. In the pediment of the arch will be the words, "Grand Army of the Republic," and be-low the motto "Fraternity, charity and The structure will be built substantially and will be quite different from the gaudy affairs which are sometimes seen on such occasions. There will be no colored bunting or streamers used in connection with this arch. It will be plain and simple and at the same time dignified.
