## THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Wheat at Seventy-Five Cents Was Strong and in Demand.

THERE WAS A CHANGE TOWARD THE CLOSE

Considering the Many Depressing Features of the Situation the Pailure of Prices to Break Was Rather Surprising.

CRICAGO, Ill., Sept. 19.—At 75c a bu. today there seemed to be millions of bushels of wheat wanted by purchasers and for sale by owners. A runior was started in some quarters that when the market reached that point for December delivery the pit would be swamped by a deluge of stop-loss orders. The instructions to buy about that price proved rather more numerous, however, than the directions to sell. Nevertheless, the feeling was on the whole neavy, and at the close he was knocked off Saturday's closing price. Corn jacked what it appears to need in order to sustain the price—a damaging frost. A further decline took place, and at the close its value was reduced he, compared with Saturday's closing quotations. Provisions were dull and a trifle lower.

At no time did the price of wheat get out of range of 56c. Considering the extreme narrowness of the trade and the many depressing features of the situation, the stubburnness with which the market resisted the efforts to break rathersorprised the trade. Among the most prominent weakening factors were the enormous receipts in the northwest-nearly 1,500 cars-the weak and lower cables and a report that the yellow flag bad again been holsted over a couple of steamers in quarantine in New York harbor, indicating that other cases of cholera and broken out there. The visible supply also proved a depressing factor. But the buying on all the weak spots was sufficient to prevent anything like a sump and prices kept tolerably steady. Buyers found a little encouragement in the fact that Chicago stocks increased but 9,000 bm, with all the heavy receipts of the past week. The outward movement by lake kept stocks from piling us. STOCKS AND BONDS.

Securities in General Began the Week with a Firm Tendency.

New York, Sept. 19.—The stock market in general began the new week with a firm temper and an undeniable advancing tendency, being aided by both higher London figures and buying by the foreign houses as well as by continued covering of shorts by the local operators. What little encouragement to buy stocks there is was furnished by the prevalent manipulation of the industrial stocks. Distillers, Sugar and Chicago Gas all being especially active and strong. But on the other hand, the disorganized conditions how prevailing among railroad affairs in the Pacific northwest furnished the strongest inducement for aliquidation for long accounts in Northern Pacific and the pressure brought to bear upon the preferred stock was such that it was driven down about 1 per cent, and such a movement acted as a check upon the naturally advancing tendency of the rest of the market. To sid the liquidation, runor had it that the most prominent director of the company was a selier of the stock and had advised its sale to his friends. That there was no lack of short sales by the bear contingent was to be expected, and the whole strength of that class of operators was concentrated upon this one point with the design of counteracting the new strength developed in the market since the announcement of the settlement of the Reading labor troubles, and these tactics were to a certain extent successful, tending to restrict buying of stock though unable to induce any new seiling movement in the general list. The natural strength of the market finally carried everything before it, and in the last hour there was an urgent demand for stocks of all kinds.
