Lion's Share of W. stern Freight Handled by the Miss uri Pacific.

AND THIS WITHOUT A CHICAGO LINE

As a Sequel the Western Traffic Association is Scheduled to Turn Up Its Toes-Prospect of a Rate War-Notes and Personals.

Chairman Midgley's report of westbound tonnage to southwestern Missouri river points for the month of June is out and it makes mighty interesting reading. Notwithstanding that the Missouri Pacific has no Chicago line the report shows that the Missouri Pacific secured 23 per cent of the tonnage, and there is going to be a jolly time among the roads, "not in it" to ascertain just how Mr. Gould's pet road got so much of the business, particularly on certain commodities. It not only carried 30 per cent of class 5 freight, but 70 per cent of the hard coal and 60 per cent of the miscellaneous ton-

when the commissioners of the Western Traffic association ordered the Missouri Pacific to divert traffic to the Wabash that road never obeyed the order. The Atchison, Burlington and Alton were ordered to divert at the same time. The Alton declined, as it had the right; the Atchison did divert for a time, then stopped, the Burlington alone complying. Now the Burlington seeing that it has been holding the sack proposes to get even and will call upon the commissioners to reimburse it in some way for its loss.

Will the Burlington Recover? But the Western Traffic association is due o pass in its checks about October 10, and it is thought that the Burlington will have no redress after that time, having been the first to give notice of withdrawal from the asso-

Mr. Geo, C. Crosby, general freight agent of the Burlington, in talking to a Ber re-porter said that his road had complied abso-lutely with the order of the commissioners and felt that some redress should be granted. "As to reimbursement," said he, "that is a question which must be settled by the powors at Chicago. Our end of the road has not been affected by the peculiar conduct of the Missouri Pacific, the evident sharp dealing only applying to southwestern Missouri river points. While I have not seen Chair-man Midgley's official report I have no doubt the facts as represented by the newspapers are correct. Considering that there are three lines competing for southwestern Missouri river points it does seem a puzzle to have the Missouri Pacific ahead on percentage when it is without a Chicago line. As to the reimbursement it is something new to me and I have no idea how the officials at Chicago will go about to secure redress. The withdrawal of the Burlington from the assonation may make a decided difference in se uring what they want."

Don't Want a Rate War. In speaking of the unrest existing among the railroad associations Mr. Crosby thought that any upheaval in transmissouri circles should be fought unceasingly, "for," said he, "indications point to a tremendous big business with all the ratiroada this year in the west. They will have all they can possibly do to take care of the business and how usc-less it would be under such circumstances to inaugurate a rate war. We are all liable to be short of cars when the grain commences to move; why then should some road unsettle the harmony which is now existing among us in this western territory? But I must confess that the situation is very strained and one cannot tell a week ahead what is likely to happen. With associations going to pieces all around us it is hardly possible for us to withstand the general crash that seems imminent. But I am' in hopes that

good judgment will prevail and things re-main stable." What the Telegraphers Want.

"The trouble between the Missouri Pacific and the Order of Railway Telegraphers is by no means as serious as the newspapers would make out," said an operator yesterday morning. "There is no strike contemplated on the Gould lines. Such a thing has not been thought of. The real points of difference between us and the Gould system are the into a yearly agreement with our order the same as is done with every other labor organization. I have no doubt but that these differences will be settled. Mr. Hammond, superintendent of telegraph at St. Louis, gave our committee a courteous hearing last week and agreed with the committee on several minor points. VALUE OF GOOD ROADS.

Omaha and Douglas County. Омана, Sept. 22.-To the Editor of THE BEE: When Douglas county voted bonds to improve the county roads, I think the importance of the act did not present itself to a large number of voters. The press made little of it and the bonds carried more because of no especial opposition than because road improvement was a measure ardently advocated as likely to result in large benefits to the community.

The past generation has been an age of railroad building, a development of highways for rapid transit, at a cost to the United States slope of more than double the value of our total output of gold and silver, and with an improvement of transportation facilities equivalent to reducing the United States to the size of the state of Nebraska, under old methods.

The perfection of the steam motor has

brought this about. We have been so intent upon building these great railways to open up communication from markets to our new lands that we have thought only in a desultory way of the improvement of the network of roads which is tributary to, and cannot be

replaced by, railways,

The fact that for hundreds of years the art
of building roads for the economical conveyance of the land traffic of the world by horsepower had be studied and such roads built seems to be scarcely thought of by the present generation; yet the grand highways of the old world stand today an evidence of the perfection to which the art had reached be-fore steam power overshadowed all previous forces for moving the world's goods. They are more valuable today than in the time of the Roman empire, and their wide introduc-tion into the United States would aid as much to the wealth of the country as has been added by the building of railroads.
It will not be long before the question will become a pressing one. In fact, questions today regarding concentration of population in towns, the attractions and lack of attrac-

tion of an agricultural life and problems bearing upon the moral temperament of our people are matters of deep import which are to be very materially reflected by the perfec-tion of horse nighways.

In some older communities near the seaboard, the matter has been already taken up and acted upon, always, so far as 1 am in-

formed, with beneficial results, correcting stagnation of agriculture and depreciation of land values in a remarkable degree. The question of improving state roads has come up at times here, and the advisability

legislative action, but the question does not seem to have become a pressing one.

Now without going into the general proposition of its vaine to the state, I ask attention to its bearing on Omaha and Doug-

In the present effort to add to the general productiveness of our city and to put us in position to supply the wants of the trade for other producers, it must be conceded that to create local conditions under which the manufactures and production of the many articles needed for this trade can be more economically carried on is the proper aim for the effort toward local development An expenditure in form of a subsidy may enable an industry to exist under unfavorable conditions for a while, but it is only a means for temporary support, or sometimes a measure of state policy; the end to be sought and effected, when possible, is the creation of conditions under which the actual cost of

To cheapen the cost of food supply, to lower rents and the cost of some raw ma-terials would contribute largely to this end, and that is what, in part, good, permanent roads into adjacent territory would do for

Omatia. Omaha.

The importance of highways of easy grade unaffected by weather, to an agricultural pupulation close to a city like Omaha is inestimable. They assure the grower a regular market for all the perishable produce which a city demands; he can deliver it on the day it is in best condition for use and a wet day with middy reads will cease to be a wet day with muddy roads will cease to be a factor in his calculations of profits. On staples he can save a material cost in haul-ing, because the better roads will enable him to double his load. The increased value of his crop will make his land more valuable and a larger number of workers will be required to care for it. In this line alone a considerable addition to our population would be made and a large part of the perishable food supply of Omaha now brought from a distance by rail could as well be

ready delivery to market existed.

Easy communication with the city would bring city purchasers of small plots of a few acres, and with them would come many advantages, which a more varied social life brings. In many respects the people of the country would become a part of the city population taging its interests at heart and population, having its interests at heart and enjoying its benefits. To them a permanent road system would be what paved streets are to the city dwellers, adding proportion-ately to their comfort and wealth. A steady and ever-increasing yield of gar-

A steady and ever-increasing yield of gar-den luxuries would make our markets an attractive feature of the city. The lower cost and better quality of food obtainable would offer inducements to manufacturing classes, which do not exist today. Good roads would open localities for the profitable operation of industries which could not exist where rents were high and

tensive addition to the drives and offer comfortable means of access to more natural and not less pleasing scenes than the park boule-vards and make the whole of Douglas

shall accord with an economic and efficient system for the county. There are questions arising in the develop-ment of such a system that require much thought in connection with local conditions, but some matters regarding design and material have been practically settled by the

of the United States. In any extended system, a plan giving easy access to the county towns, and from them to the city, would make them important sub-urbs and bring to them and closer to the farmer many city advantages.
