ORDINANCE NO. 3261.

An ordinance to prohibit the establishment of additional cometeries or additions thereto within the city of Omaha, and providing penalties for the violation of this ordin-ance. ance.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Omaha:

Section I. It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any person or persons, association, corporation or otherwise, to establish, lay out provide, or prepire within the limits of the city of Omaha, cemeteries for the burial of the dead, additional to such as are or may the dead, additional to such as are, or may now be in existence therein; or to establish, lay out, or provide additional cometery space, ground or burial place for the burial of the dead, that is or may be an enlargement or in-

crease of ground or space now laid out exist

dead, that is or may be an enlargement or increase of ground or space now hald out existing or prepared or set aside and in actual use for such purpose.

Section 2 it is hereby declared to be unlawful to sell, give away, lease, grant, or otherwise pispose of lots, piats, parts or pieces of ground so laid out, established or prepared as in section 1 of this ordinance set fourth; or to cause, procure, take part in, permit, authorize or allow the interment or burial of the dead therein.

Section 3. Any person or persons, associations or corporation or otherwise violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a missiemeanor and upon conviction thereof any person or persons so offending, at d in case of an association or corporation, the duly elected and existing officers thereof shall be fined not less than \$55 nor more than \$100 for each and every act, violation, or offense herein designated and set forth.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Decision Against the Union Pacific Further Complicates Traffic Matters.

MAHA RECEIVES ANOTHER KNOCKOUT

By the Recent Ruling This City Cannot Compete for Montana Business at All -News of Railroads and Railroad Men.

Once more Omaha gets knocked out. This ime the "Pompadour Jim" is the Denver & Rio Grande Western, and the Union Pacific has one of two things to do, either submit or et out of the Western Traffic association, and it is very much doubted if it will do the

The decision rendered yesterday by the commissioners of the Western Traffic assonation, Messra, Walker, Midgley, Faithorn, Caldwell, Smith and Vining, that the rate nade by the Union Pacific to Montana points, a cut of \$8.75, be restored, to take effect October 10, 1892, will, should the road agree to the restoration, work a hardship not only on Missouri gateways but will deprive the Union Pacific of Montana business. It s a blow at Omaha, at Sait Lake and Ogden and seems to have been aimed by the Rio Grande Western at Missouri river points in favor of St. Paul and the

orthern route. When the Union Pacific made the rate now in operation to Montana points it did so be-cause there was no competitor for that business outside the Northern Pacific and Great Northern, the Rio Grande Western ot having a finger in the pie. But through spite or petty jealousy the latter road brought the cut rate to the attention of the commis-sioners last May and now after nearly a year. when the whole thing seems forgotten, they reopen the sore by declaring against the Union Pacific on a proposition that on its face would have clearly been decided the other way; at least that is the opinion that prevails in the passenger department of the Union Pacific. Union Pacific.

### Smelled of Sulphur.

There was a sulphurous odor about the passenger department yesterday which, had Mr. Lomax been present, would have been largely augmented for his views regarding this case are sufficiently well known and that he believed common justice would be done in this matter his subsequent abandonment of the

case clearly shows. In a word, the decision holds that if the Union Pacific complies with the decision of he commissioners it will increase the rate \$8.75 from and to Montana points from the Missouri river, and also just that much from the river east, the rates via St. Paul over the Northern Pacific and Great Northern remaining as now. The Rio Grande Western does no business from Montana points to the east and the rate made by the Inion Pacific in nowise worked a hardship on the Western for all tickets sold by the Rio Grande Western eastbound read over the Union Pacific, the latter road not selling tickets that way. That the situation may be made additionally clearer, train No 7 on the Union Pacific goes via Ogden, taking the southern branch from Greep River and makes Montana connections at Pocatello. Train No. 1 goes via Green River and Pocatello and is thus thrown out of Montana connections. In order that the basis of competition might be lessened this rate was made, the other road having a much shorter route to traverse to Montana points. Mr. Lomax in making the rate reserved the right to change at any time, for he had an idea that the day would come when all the Union Pacific trains would run via Ogden instead of Green River and Pocatello, shortening the distance to the Sound country.

Sends Business to St. Paul. With the increase of \$8.75 on first and second class business, the rate from the river will be \$48.75 and \$38.75, the rate from St. Paul, \$40 and \$30 respectively. The rate from Chicago to St. Paul is \$11.25, which, added to the first class rate (\$40) to Montana points, would make the rate from Chicago, \$51,25; second class, \$41.25. On the other hand, the rate from Chicago to Council Bluffs is \$10 which, added to the rate in force on October 0 (\$48.75), will make the first class passage \$58.75 and second class \$48.75, a difference (\$8.75) which the traveling public will naturally take into account, and Omana, Salt Lake and Ogden will be holding the bag,

while the business will be diverted to St. Paul. a theory," said a gentleman who is near the head of the passenger department, and what Mr. Lomax will do when he returns from Chicago is a serious question. Claimants, Wise and Otherw se. The grav-haired claimant, with elbows peoping through his seedy sleeves and tired feet in solcless shoes, shuffling timidly up the steps of the departments at Washington, is a familiar figure in fletien, and not altogether unknown in real life. But he is not likely to be encountered much longer. His occupation is gone. Not that there are no longer claimants—there are more of them than there ever were before, and their number is likely to keep on increasing indefinite-ly. But they have learned better than to haunt the departments in person. They have learned that they can accomplish their object to much better advantage, and with much more comfort to themselves, by in trusting their cases to the bands of persons who make a business of attending to such

matters.

The old saying that a man who is his own lawyer has a fool for a client may be a little too sweeping. We would not state the truth which it contains in quite so harsh a form. But it is entirely within bounds to say that the claimant who tries to look after his own claim instead of having it prosecuted by a competent attorney does not understand his own interests.

There are two ways of pushing a claim

against the government. One is to do it by correspondence with the proper officials, the other to have it urged by the personal efforts of somebody on the spot. The claimant who tries the first method will not be at very tries the first method will not be at very great expense, except for postage stamps, but he can congratulate timself upon having secured employment for life. The files of the department are loaded with letters from persons who have tried to advance their claims in this way, each latter accompanied by a copy of the polite typewritten response in which the applicant was told that his communication had plicant was told that his communication had

een received and would have due considera-

tion at the proper time. When a claimant is convinced that he can do nothing by correspondence and that he must adopt the remaining alternative of personal pressure he finds two courses open to him. He may camp in Washington and exert the pressure himself or he may entrust the work to a resident agent. In adopting the former plan he must be prepared to abandon his business and spend some years in Washington. He will have high living expenses to meet and nothing coming in to meet them. He will be snubbed by door-keepers and informed by private secretaries that their chief is not in. He will join the ranks of seedy claimants to whom we re-ferred in the beginning, and if he finally secures his money, he will be likely to find, unless his claim be an unusually heavy one,

that it will not make good what he has spent to get it.

If he be well advised at the start and put his case into the hands of a capable attorne he will have no expense or trouble until his claim is allowed. Of course care in the selection of an agent is necessary, for there are attorneys in Washington who bleed their clients like leeches, and who accomplish less for them, at greater expense, than they could accomplish for themselves. But a claim agency of the right kind will take every honest claim, push it with all the energy the claimant could exert for himself, and, with all the effectiveness belonging to long praccice and an intimate acquaintance with all the workings of the government service, and tharge nothing until successful, and then not as much as the client would spend in a

He said the annual contributions and expenditures of the Mis-sionary union for the missionary work amounted to \$600,000. There have been more than 160,000 heathen Christianized through the efforts of this organization. The union supports nearly 500 missionaries in foreign lands and has established more than 1,000 churches among the heathen.
