### Park Case Settled.

The case of Arnold against the city of Council Bluffs, which has been pending in the supreme court for nearly two years, has been decided at last, and with it is brought to a summary end all the other litigation which has had for its object the title to Fairmount park. On its first trial before Judge Macy in the district court of this county a judgment was given in favor of the city and the case was taken to the supreme court, where Judge Macy's decision was affirmed, the last decision having been rendered last spring. About a week ago Attorney Sims, who represented the plaintiff, submitted to the supreme court a motion for a rehearing, and the overruling of this motion last week now sets the case probably forever at rest. The same legal points are involved in all other cases which involve the ownership of the park lands, the point on which the fight was made by the plaintiffs being an alleged irregularity in the method of condemnation employed by the city. Consequently this decision sets at rest all doubt as to the final outcome of the other


