How to Vote. Unless voters are very careful they will find their wishes thwarted in trying to declare their preferences for constables and justices of the peace. For those who vote straight tickets clear through the procedure is very simple, because all that is useded is to place a cross in the circle at the head of the tielest. It is also a quite simple opera-tion to vote scratches where there are only two candidates for an office. In this case the voter simply has to make a cross in the circle at the top of the ticket they desire to vote, and then if they desire to scratch some particular name they can make another cross opposite the name of the particular candidate for whom they want to vote on the

In the cases of the justices of the peace. and constables, however, this will not do, for there being three of each the judges can-

not tell which one to drop.

For instance, suppose a republican wanted to vote the straight ticket except for justices and constables. He should put a cross in the circle at the head of the ticket at the eft of the word "republican," and then if he wanted to vote for one democratic justice of the peace he should put a cross opposite that particular name, and also a cross opposite two names on the republican ticket. This would plainly indicate that he wants to vote for two republican justices and one demo-cratic justice. If no simply puts a cross-opposite the name of a democratic nominee for justice of the peace, and puts no mars opposite any of the republican justices, the ballot will show that he votes for four jus-tices, one more than the law allows, and his tices, one more than the law allows, and his vote on justices will not count. The voters should thoroughly acquaint themselves with these dotails, as the same rule which applies to scratching other parts of the ticket will not work in the case of constables and jus-


