OUTPUT OF PRECIOUS METALS

Director of the Mint Oelrich Makes His Annual Report.

SOME VERY INTERESTING FIGURES

What American Mines Have Been Doing for the Past Year-Coinage of Gold and Silver-Ruling Price of the White Metal.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nev. 2.-E. O. Oelsich, director of the mint, has submitted to the secretary of the treasury a report on the Operations of the mints and assay offices of the United States for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1892. The value of the gold deposited at the mints and assay offices during the Year was \$50,476,975. Of the original depos-Its, \$31,961,546 were the product of our own mines, \$24,005,342 foreign gold and bullion, \$555,978 light weight demestic gold coin and \$3,300,604 old mineral.

The deposits and purchases of silver aggre gated 71,480,805 standard ounces, of the coining value of \$83,922,930.

Of the silver received 63,130,009 standard Ounces, of the coining value of \$73,461,072 were the product of domestic mines and refluories; 2,118,078 standard ounces of the coining value of \$2,464,672, were foreign silver bullion and coin; 5,583,907 standard Ounces of the coinage value of \$6,509,274, were current domestic coins for recoinage; 1.921 standard ounces of the coinage value of \$2,236 trade dollars melter; and 636,200 standard ounces of the coinage value of

\$140,411 old plate jewelry, etc.

The coinage of the mints during the last fiscal year aggregated 113,556,124 pieces, valued as follows: Gold, \$35,506,897; silver dollars, \$8,329,467; subsidiary silver, \$6,650, \$12; minor coins, \$1,296,110; total, \$51,783,286. Profits from Silver.

The profit from silver dollars coined dur-ing the fiscal year from bullion purchased ander the act of July 14, 1890, was \$930,487. The net profit on the coinage of silver during fourteen years, including the balance in the coinage mints on July 1, 1878, has aggregated

The total amount of silver purchased during the year aggregated 54,055,755 fine cunces, costing \$51,106,608, at an average cost of 94 cents per fine cunce. Since July 1, 1892, the average price has been \$3,724. By the recoinage of uncurrent coins in the treasury, principally half dollars, into new quarter dollars and dimes, for which there is in urgent demand, the treasury has been re amail change of the country increased to a corresponding extent. The net profits or earnings of the mints over expenditures is \$793,794. The mines of the United States produced during the calendar year 1891, 1,604,849 fine ounces of gold of a commercial value of \$33, 175,000 and a coining value of \$33,176,000, and 58,330,000 fine ounces of silver of a commercial value of \$57,630,030 and a coining Value of \$75,116,565.

The stock of gold and silver in the United States on November 1, 1892, based upon official tabulations brought forward from year to year was approximately: Gold, \$656,041,-863; silver, \$587,614,951, a total of \$1,243,-The amount of money in actual circulation (outside of the treasury vauits), including paper and metallic, was \$1,606,139,735, or

4.34 per capita.
The value of the gold bars furnished for industrial uses during the last calendar year shows an increase of \$42,039,053, and of silver an increase of \$600,658. If there has been no failing off in the amount of coin melted annually for use in repairs and sewery the total value of the precious metals used in the industrial arts and manufactures in the United States during the last year was approximately: Gold, \$19,700,000; \$11, ver, \$9,630,000; a total of \$19,330,000, of which \$10,697,679 gold and \$7,280,073 silver consisted

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 2 .- William Mil-Ber, Albert Krumbach and Warren Hill, all Young men, started from the castern shore at Point Breeze last evening in a row boat to cross the river. When about 150 feet From the shore one of the men lighted his pip and carclessly tossed the blazing match into the water. The young men were forced to abandon their craft and plunge into the burning fluid around them. They tried to swim ashore. Hill sank beneath the blazing surface and was seen no more.
