First Appearance of the Kangaroo Makes a Decided Hit.

ALL GOOD CITIZENS LIKE THE SYSTEM

Voters Turn Out Early and Cast Their Bailots Quickly - Quiet Election in the City-What the Count Shows

The Australian baltot system played to its first Council Bluffs audience yesterday and scored a nit.

The gentiemen who bave managed elections, bought votes and made themselves generally disagreeable were out of a job and wandered disconsolately up and down the streets trying to find out what had happened. while the fellows who have been in the habit of selling their votes spent their time trying to figure out whether they would work or wear ragged trousers this winter. The innovation was a welcome one to the candidates, who found it unnecessary to buy up friends and supporters at \$: or a drink of whisky a head. But there was no one who enjoyed the change better than the voters, who found themselves able, for the first time in their

lives, to vote as they saw fit without having to answer to ward-worker; or any one else. The voting went on rapidly from the time the polls were opened in the morning. Every one seemed to have a curlosity to see how the new scheme would operate and the consequence was that by neen fully half the number of voters that had registered had put in their ballots, and by 2 o'clock in the afternoon in some of the wards the voting

was almost through.
One thing in connection with the election that caused recisiderable adverse comment was the taxity with which that section of the law was enforced prohibling outsiders from congregating within 100 feet from the polling places. The crowds were not large nor disorderly, nor was the usual amount of electioneering done under the noises of the judges, and yet they caused just confusion enough to make people wonder whether or not the spe cial policemen were trying to earn their sal-

B" 5 o'clock in the afternoon the number of votes polled amounted to a little over 3,500, and the voting was going on herrily in a way that indicated that all the 4,400 votes would be in before the polls closed. When the polls opened in the morning announcements were made as to the time of keeping the polls open, and in accordance with those announcements they were not closed in some of the wards until 7 o'clock, and in two instances not until 8. It was consequently interwhen the counting was commenced, and the time of sending in the complete returns will be correspondingly

The counting of votes is proceeding very slowly and but few satisfactory returns wil be in before this morning. In spite of the fact that the vote was almost full in every precinct, the results show that considerably less than the full vote was counted, because a number of tickets had to be thrown out in every ward on account of a fellure to mark them up according to law. The First precinct of the First ward, upon the heads of the tlekets being counted, showed the result as follows: Cleveland, 191; Harrison, 125; Weaver, 19; Bid-well, 3. The Second presenct of the First ward was as follows: Cleveland, 194; Har-rison, 184; Weaver, 26; Bidwell, 11. The First precinct of the Second ward showed a majority of 18 for Harrison. In

the Third the republicans were also ahead by 60. In the Second precinct of the Fifth ward Cleveland received 115 votes to Harri son's 126. Kane outside went republican as usual, by a vote of 16 to 9 democratic and 3

people's party.
A count of the straight tickets in the First precinct of the Fourth ward gave Harrison the lead, the vote being Harrison 180, Cleve-land 74. In the Second precinct of the Fourth and the Second of the Third the vote was very evenly divided so far as the straight tickets were concerned, Harrison leading by a very slight majority. At 11 o'clock the general impression was, even among the democrats, that Council


