How Young Jerry Enix Really Met His Death Monday.

HE WAS SHOT BY HIS COMPANION

William Watton Tells the True Story of the Breadful Affair Before the Coroner's Jury-He Was Frightened at First.

William Watton is now suffering from the effects of an erroneous idea that he could pull the wool over the eyes of a coroner's jury. He is the young man who went hunting with Jerry Enix Monday aftersoon, Mrs. F. M. Gault entertained a social last.

and made a thorough investigation of the surroundings. They found a very strange state of affairs. The gun, which according to Watton's story, had gone off while in Emx's hands, was lying fully ten feet from the body. The body was absolutely free from powder marks, which showed that the musale of the gua must have been at least six or seven feet away when it went off. Furthermore, it was found that the shot from the gun had spread all over the side of the dead man's face and neck, and his right shoulder was riddled with the pellots of leau, almost us far as the spinal column. They at once determined that the story which Watton told was fairs, and that Enix had been shot by the gun when it was in Watton's hands.

They accordingly went to work on that the ory, which was followed out at the inquest. Watton himself was the first witness at the inquest. He stuck to his first story, not knowing of the results of the marshal's in-vestigation. Enix, he said, had carried the gun from the time they left home until the shooting took place. He described in detail the positions of himself and Enix at the time the gun went off, although he contra-dicted himself in a number of instances, and his whole story was evidently a patchwork of falsehoods, designed with a view of shield-ing hymself from t e consequences of an act of which he considered himself guilty. After ie had in vain tried to make his story hang ogether he was taken into a back room and told by one of the members of the jury that he was doing himself more harm than good by telling such a story. After being allowed to look at the body with the snot in the back he was again taken out, and then he admit-

ted that he had made up a story.

He was given another chance, and he then admitted to the jury that he had been standing with the gun resting on his left arm, pointing toward Enix, with his linger on the trigger. A rabbic suddenly appeared and he started to run, but slipped and fell. The gan went off and he saw Enix fall. Calling 'Oh Jerry," and seing that his companion did not move, he became frightened and ran back to town. He found his father and told him that he had shot Jerry. His father told him to run right to the city building and no-tity the police of what had happened. On the way he decided to tell a story which would throw the responsibility of the affair

on the dead boy.

His father, Samuel Watton, was next put on the stand, and without knowing it he denied the boy's statement. He said that the boy's first words when he arrived at the house, all out of breath, were, "Father, Jerry's shot himself,"

There was another discrepancy, and the poy was recalled in order to give him another boy was recalled in order to give him another chance to correct himself. He stuck to his second story, bowever. Frank Enix, the father of the dead boy, was then put on the stand, but nothing of much value was obtained from him, he having been in Harmon, Neb., when the accident took place, and having arrived home only about ten minutes before he received his summons to appear before the jury. He said, however, as did before the jury. He said, however, as did both the other witnesses, that he had never known of any trouble between the boys. In act, they had never had very much to do

with one snother until last Priday.

The jury then retired and a few minutes inter returned with the following verdict:
"We, the jury, find that the deceased came to his death by being shot by a gun in the hands of William Watton, and recommond that the said William Watton be held for a preliminary examination.

Watton was immediately taken before Justice Hammer, where an information was filed charging him with murder. He waived examination, and was taken to the county juil to await the action of the grand jury. He showed but little feeling during the later proceedings, although while he was giving his testimony and undergoing a catechism at the hands of the members of catechism at the hands of the members of the jury, he was visibly agitated. He has all the uppearance of a young man who is not too strong in the upper story.




